*Basic Problems of Ethnopsychiatry* George Devereux, 1980 In these sixteen essays written between 1939 and 1965 George Devereux argues that the understanding of all human behavior requires the application of both psychological and sociocultural methods of explanation This unique approach which differentiates sanity and insanity from social adjustment and maladjustment provides a rigorous foundation for a general theory of psychoanalytic ethnopsychiatry George Devereux a psychoanalyst and anthropologist discusses crime sexual delinquency dreams in non Western cultures and cannibalistic drives of parents He frequently cites case material from his extensive field work with the Mahave Indians of Arizona and the Sedang Moi of Vietnam and from his clinical work with non Western patients

**Controversies and Dilemmas in Contemporary Psychiatry** Dusan Kecmanovic, 2017-09-08 The controversies and dilemmas in contemporary psychiatry are so numerous and serious that they to a great extent define psychiatry Yet most psychiatrists pay little attention to the field s controversies maintaining that talking about controversies tarnishes psychiatry s reputation and them along with it Critics of psychiatry use these controversies and dilemmas along with psychiatrists unwillingness to discuss them to undermine psychiatry They question the existence of mental disorder and the purpose of psychiatric therapy Kecmanovic undertakes a major effort of resolving with science not ideology such dilemmas Although psychiatrists give no thought to the mind body relationship their attitude towards this relationship determines their approach to the mentally ill their understanding of the origin and nature of the mental disorder and the therapy they think has priority Sometimes psychiatrists implicitly or explicitly cite a specific school of philosophy in order to find conceptual support for their particular practice As a result psychiatrists do not speak the same language about the same issues Kecmanovic suggests that there can be no dialogue without common language opposing views cannot converge without dialogue The behavior of the mentally ill is socially jarring This is a major reason why the mentally ill are considered to be a menace They threaten prevailing manners of communicating expressing one s thoughts and feelings and the existing meaning of symbols in a given environment Deviance of a person with a mental disorder is specific socially perceived as incomprehensible irrational and unpredictable What is common to all reactions to the disruptive nature of a mental disorder is the desire to be protected from those with illness in other words to put them under control and supervision

**Distorted Bodies and Suffering Souls.** Chantal Kwast-Greff, 2013 Chaos Pain Self mutilation Women starve themselves They burn or slash their own flesh or their babies throats and slam their newborns against walls Their bodies are the canvases on which the suffering of the soul carves itself with knife and razor In Australian fiction written by women between 1984 and 1994 female characters inscribe their inner chaos on their bodies to exert whatever power they have over themselves Their self inflicted pain is both reaction and language the bodily sign not only of their enfeeblement but also to a certain extent of their empowerment of themselves and their world The texts considered in this book chiefly by Margaret Coombs Kate Grenville Fiona Place Penelope Rowe Leone Sperling and Amy Witting function as both defiance and acceptance of prevailing discourses of femininity and patriarchy between submission and a possible future The narratives of anorexia bulimia fatness self mutilation incest and murder shock the reader into an understanding of deeper meanings of body and soul and prompt a tentative interpretation of fiction in relation to the world of real women and men in contemporary white Australia This is affective literature with the reader in voyeuristic complicity Holding up the mirror of fiction the women writers act perforce as a social lever their narratives as Bildungsromane But there is a risk that of reinforcing stereotypes and codes of conduct which supposedly long gone still represent women as victims Why are the female characters self destroyers and victims Why are they not heroes saviours or conquerors If women read about women themselves and feel pity for the Other they read about they will also feel pity for themselves there is little happiness in being a woman But infanticide and distorting the body are problem solving behaviours In truth the bodies of the female characters bear the marks and scars of the history of their mothers and the history of their grandmothers indeed that of their own the history of survivors      *A History of Madness in Sixteenth-Century Germany* H. C. Erik Midelfort, 1999 This magisterial work

explores how Renaissance Germans understood and experienced madness. It focuses on the insanity of the world in general but also on specific disorders, examines the thinking on madness of theologians, jurists, and physicians, and analyzes the vernacular ideas that propelled sufferers to seek help in pilgrimage or newly founded hospitals for the helplessly disordered. In the process, the author uses the history of madness as a lens to illuminate the history of the Renaissance, the Reformation, and Counter Reformation, the history of poverty and social welfare, and the history of princely courts, state building, and the civilizing process. Rather than try to fit historical experience into modern psychiatric categories, this book reconstructs the images and metaphors through which Renaissance Germans themselves understood and experienced mental illness and deviance, ranging from such bizarre conditions as St. Vitus's dance and demonic possession to such medical crises as melancholy and mania. By examining the records of shrines and hospitals where the mad went for relief, we hear the voices of the mad themselves. For many religious Germans, sin was a form of madness, and the sinful world was thoroughly insane. This book compares the thought of Martin Luther and the medical religious reformer Paracelsus, who both believed that madness was a basic category of human experience. For them and others, the sixteenth century was an age of increasing demonic presence; the demon possessed seemed to be everywhere. For Renaissance physicians, however, the problem was finding the correct ancient Greek concepts to describe mental illness. In medical terms, the late sixteenth century was the age of melancholy. For jurists, the customary insanity defense did not clarify whether melancholy persons were responsible for their actions, and they frequently solicited the advice of physicians. Sixteenth-century Germany was also an age of folly, with fools filling a major role in German art and literature and present at every prince and princeling's court. The author analyzes what Renaissance Germans meant by folly and examines the lives and social contexts of several court fools.
