In a country under occupation, Caradoc, lover to Breaca, is caught and faces the ultimate penalty. Only B'n has the power to save him, and B'n has spent the past ten years denying his past. Treachery divides these two heroes, but heroism brings them together again, changed out of all recognition, but it may not be enough to heal the wounds.
