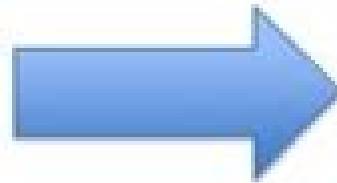

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The Classical Hollywood Reader Steve Neale, 2012-11-12 The Classical Hollywood Reader brings together essential readings to provide a history of Hollywood from the 1910s to the mid 1960s Following on from a Prologue that discusses the aesthetic characteristics of Classical Hollywood films Part 1 covers the period between the 1910s and the mid to late 1920s It deals with the advent of feature length films in the US and the growing national and international dominance of the companies responsible for their production distribution and exhibition In doing so it also deals with film making practices aspects of style the changing roles played by women in an increasingly business oriented environment and the different audiences in the US for which Hollywood sought to cater Part 2 covers the period between the coming of sound in the mid 1920s and the beginnings of the demise of the studio system in late 1940s In doing so it deals with the impact of sound on films and film production in the US and Europe the subsequent impact of the Depression and World War II on the industry and its audiences the growth of unions and the roles played by production managers and film stars at the height of the studio era Part 3 deals with aspects of style censorship technology and film production It includes articles on the Production Code music and sound cinematography and the often neglected topic of animation Part 4 covers the period between 1946 and 1966 It deals with the demise of the studio system and the advent of independent production In an era of demographic and social change it looks at the growth of drive in theatres the impact of television the advent of new technologies the increasing importance of international markets the Hollywood blacklist the rise in art house imports and in overseas production and the eventual demise of the Production Code Designed especially for courses on Hollywood Cinema the Reader includes a number of newly researched and written chapters and a series of introductions to each of its parts It concludes with an epilogue a list of resources for further research and an extensive bibliography

John Ford Made Westerns Gaylyn Studlar, Matthew Bernstein, 2001-04-22 The Western is arguably the most popular and longlived form in cinematic history and the acknowledged master of that genre was John Ford His Westerns including *The Searchers* *Stagecoach* and *The Man Who Shot Liberty Valance* have had an enormous influence on contemporary U S filmmakers and on everything from *Star Wars* to *Taxi Driver* In nine majors essays from some of the most prominent scholars of Hollywood film John Ford Made Westerns Filming The Legend in The Sound Era situates the sound era westerns of John Ford within contemporary critical contexts and regards them from fresh perspectives These range from examining Ford's relation to other art forms most notably literature painting and music to exploring the development of the director's public reputation as a director of Westerns Articles also address the intricacies of Ford's shifting approach to storytelling and the subtle

techniques whereby Ford's films guide spectator interpretation and emotional engagement. While giving attention to film style and structure, the volume also explores the ways in which these much-loved films engage with notions of masculinity and gender roles, capitalism and community, as well as racial and sexual identity. Authors also examine how Ford's sound-era Westerns create a complex relationship to the genre's traditional project of defining an American nation and how they uphold up but also question popular culture depictions of history and nationhood to offer a commentary that engages with both the past, the present, and the future. In addition to new scholarship, the volume also offers a dossier section of out-of-the-way magazine articles that illuminate the issues raised by essays, including the director's tribute to John Wayne as well as a moving posthumous appraisal of the director published by the Director's Guild of America.

The Death of Classical Cinema Joe McElhaney, 2012-02-01 The Death of Classical Cinema uncovers the extremely rich yet insufficiently explored dialogue between classical and modernist cinema, examining the work of three classical filmmakers: Alfred Hitchcock, Fritz Lang, and Vincente Minnelli, and the films they made during the decline of the traditional Hollywood studio system. Faced with the significant challenges posed by alternative art cinema and modernist filmmaking practices in the early 1960s, these directors responded with films that were self-conscious attempts at keeping pace with the developments in film modernism. These films—Lang's *The Thousand Eyes of Dr. Mabuse*, Hitchcock's *Marnie*, and Minnelli's *Two Weeks in Another Town*—were widely regarded as failures at the time and bolstered critics' claims concerning the irrelevance of their directors in relation to contemporary filmmaking. However, author Joe McElhaney sheds new light on these films by situating them in relation to such acclaimed modernist works of the period as Godard's *Contempt*, Fellini's *La dolce vita*, Antonioni's *Red Desert*, and Resnais's *Last Year at Marienbad*. He finds that these modernist films, rather than being diametrically opposed in form to the work of Hitchcock, Lang, and Minnelli, are in fact profoundly linked to them.

Writing the Character-Centered Screenplay, Updated and Expanded edition Andrew Horton, 2000-02-23 We need good screenwriters who understand character. Everywhere Andrew Horton traveled in researching this book, from Hollywood to Hungary, he heard the same refrain. Yet most of the standard how-to books on screenwriting follow the film industry's earlier lead in focusing almost exclusively on plot and formulaic structures. With this book, Horton, a film scholar and successful screenwriter, provides the definitive work on the character-based screenplay. Exceptionally wide-ranging, covering American, international, mainstream, and off-Hollywood films, as well as television, the book offers creative strategies and essential practical information. Horton begins by placing screenwriting in the context of the storytelling tradition, arguing through literary and cultural analysis that all great stories revolve around a strong central character. He then suggests specific techniques and concepts to help any writer, whether new or experienced, build more vivid characters and screenplays. Centering his discussion around four film

examples including *Thelma Louise* and *The Silence of the Lambs* and the television series *Northern Exposure* he takes the reader step by step through the screenwriting process starting with the development of multi dimensional characters and continuing through to rewrite Finally he includes a wealth of information about contests fellowships and film festivals Espousing a new character based approach to screenwriting this engaging insightful work will prove an essential guide to all of those involved in the writing and development of film scripts

Robert Altman and the Elaboration of Hollywood Storytelling Mark Minett, 2021 Robert Altman and the Elaboration of Hollywood Storytelling reveals an Altman barely glimpsed in previous critical accounts of the filmmaker This re examination of his seminal work during the Hollywood Renaissance or New Hollywood period of the early 1970s including *M A S H* *Brewster McCloud* *McCabe* *Mrs Miller* *Images* *The Long Goodbye* *Thieves Like Us* *California Split* and *Nashville* sheds new light on both the films and the filmmaker reframing Altman as a complex pragmatic innovator whose work exceeds but is also grounded in the norms of classical Hollywood storytelling rather than someone who rejected those norms in favor of modernist art cinema Its findings and approach hold important implications for the study of cinematic authorship Largely avoiding thematic exegesis it employs an historical poetics approach robust functionalist frameworks archival research and formal and statistical analysis to demystify the essential features of the standard account of Altman s filmmaking history and profile lax narrative form heavy reliance on the zoom sound design replete with overlapping dialogue improvisational infidelity to the screenplay and a desire to subvert based in his time in the training grounds of industrial filmmaking and filmed television The book provides a clear example of how a filmmaker might work collaboratively and pragmatically within and across media institutions to elaborate upon their sanctioned practices and aims We misunderstand Altman s work and the creative work of Hollywood filmmakers in general when we insist on describing innovation as opposition to institutional norms and on describing those norms as simply assimilating innovation
