Bernard Shaw, Director Bernard F. Dukore, 2025-10-03 You see madam Bernard Shaw once wrote I am not a dreamer who doesn't understand the practical exigencies of the stage The remark was an understatement Shaw not only understood the practical aspects of play production he had a great deal of experience with them as well For thirty years following the 1894 production of *Arms and the Man* which he directed Shaw staged virtually every production of his own plays in London Directing plays he consistently maintained is as crucial a part of a playwright's profession as writing them and the author he believed is the most desirable director of his own play Originally published in 1971 this first full length treatment of Shaw as director is important for several reasons first because Shaw was one of the few major playwrights who frequently directed his own works second because he was a good director and third because he is an early example of the modern idea of the director as guiding artist in the production of a play After an initial chapter examining Shaw's background and experiences in the theatre before he began to direct plays Dukore explores various aspects of Shawian directorial theory and practice He shows that while Shaw's basic concern was with the actor he was also involved in all the minute considerations that make up a successful production including pre rehearsal planning casting cutting and changing the script though Shaw forbade other directors to cut his plays he himself did so conducting rehearsals acting scenery lighting and costuming Throughout his analysis the author makes use of previously unpublished material particularly Shaw's rehearsal notes written in the auditorium when he staged his plays and letters to actors This is a readable book essential for anyone interested in Bernard Shaw's plays

Bernard Shaw on Cinema Bernard Shaw, 1997 With his customary wit and quite often with remarkable prescience Bernard Shaw maintained a dialogue on cinema that ran almost from the infancy of the industry in 1908 until his death in 1950 Bernard F Dukore presents the first collection of Bernard Shaw's writings and oral statements about cinema Of the more than one hundred comments Dukore has selected fifty nine more than half are new to today's readers Twelve are previously unpublished one is published in full for the first time and forty six appear in a collected edition of Shaw's writings for the first time since their publication in newspapers and magazines Very early in the life of cinema Shaw perceived that as an invention movies would be more momentous than the printing press because they appealed to the illiterate as well as the literate to the manual laborer at the end of an exhausting day as well as to the person with more leisure He predicted that cinema would form people's minds and shape their conduct

He recognized that cinema's colossal proportions make mediocrity compulsory by leveling art and life down to the blandest morality and to the lowest common denominator of potential audiences throughout the world. By 1908 Shaw was familiar with experiments synchronizing movies and sound. When talkies arrived he discerned that they would precipitate major changes in acting, writing, and economics. He also saw how they would affect live theatre. The theatre may survive as a place where people are taught to act, he said in 1930, but apart from that there will be nothing but talkies soon. At that time few people in the theatrical profession were making such prophecies, at least not in public.

Laurence notes that theatrics connotes not only activities of a theatrical character but behaviour that manifests itself as theatricality. All the correspondence selected for this volume, most of it hitherto unpublished, relates to Bernard Shaw's theatre dealings and theatrical interest at the same time, attesting to the histrionic instinct and theatricized imagination of the man who penned them. More than one hundred letters are represented, starting from mid 1889 when Shaw had not yet completed his first play and was known instead as a music critic, journalist, socialist organizer, and street orator. The letters reveal a consummate man of the theatre: a dramatist, director, actor, designer, publicist, financial

backer translator and critic concerned with such varied issues as censorship theatre politics prying journalists and wireless and television performance The letters are shaded with histrionic tones of assumed anger irritation and anguish The style invariably is colloquial free flowing ebullient and personal v 2 Bernard Shaw and H G Wells are among the best known and most controversial literary figures of the twentieth century Both were rebelliously critical of the social and political familial and sexual conventions and structures of their time They shared broadly similar interests but their lifestyles differed sharply as did their views on many subjects including those discussed in their correspondence religion socialism science war and world history the theatre the profession of authorship and more The letters are always forthright often abusive and quarrelsome sometimes suggesting that the relationship cannot last They are also often warm good natured playful and generous reflecting a fundamental mutual respect and similarity of outlook however contrasting the temperament and style The great majority of the two writers correspondence is published here for the first time v 3 After movie makers in England bungled film versions of Bernard Shaw s *How He Lied to Her Husband* and *Arms and the Man* producers and directors in Germany and Holland botched those based on *Pygmalion* and a Hollywood screenplay desecrated *The Devil s Disciple* Shaw took a chance on Gabriel Pascal and gave him permission to produce a movie version of *Pygmalion* in England The contract was signed on 13 December 1935 and Pascal a charming flamboyant Hungarian emigre with relatively little experience in cinema did the playwright proud Shaw s gamble paid off in this *Pygmalion* which to this day is usually claimed to be the best film version of any of his plays v 4 Virtually ignored in histories of twentieth century British theatre in favour of the more celebrated relationship of Bernard Shaw and Harley Granville Barker the friendship of Bernard Shaw and Sir Barry Jackson is given prominence in this new book by L W Conolly The collection of 183 letters all but two of which are previously unpublished sheds new light on a partnership that for Shaw was the most important of his later playwriting career and for Jackson was central to his pioneering and acclaimed work in British regional theatre in both Birmingham and Stratford upon Avon v 5 Bernard Shaw was twenty four and Sidney Webb twenty one when they met in October 1880 at a gathering of a debating club called the Zetetical Society Having sympathetic interests both men decided after some personal and joint exploration to devote their lives to improving the human condition This collection of 140 annotated letters 74 of which have never been published documents the subsequent friendship and collaboration shared by Shaw Webb and Webb s wife Beatrice throughout their lives v 6 George Bernard Shaw and Nancy Lady Astor enjoyed a close friendship for over twenty years from the late 1920s until Shaw s death in 1950 Although opposites in many matters particularly politics Shaw and Astor were irresistibly attracted to each other both being unconventional firebrands with ready wits This collection of nearly 250 letters between Shaw and Astor as well as between Astor and Shaw s wife Charlotte and Shaw s secretary Blanche Patch illustrates the rewarding friendship the two shared and the numerous issues they debated v 7 George Bernard Shaw 1856 1950 once quipped that it is up to the author to take care of himself This rich selection of Shaw s correspondence with his US

and UK publishers proves how much the dramatist lived up to his own words by providing the details of his steady involvement in the publication of his works v 8 Unlikely friends and collaborators Bernard Shaw and Gilbert Murray carried on a lively and wide ranging correspondence for more than fifty years When they began exchanging letters in the late 1890s Shaw was a renowned Fabian propagandist reviewer and author of anti conventional plays Murray was a classicist and translator of ancient Greek drama who would eventually become Regius Professor of Greek at Oxford Beginning with their shared distaste for the popular well made plays of the era their correspondence quickly expanded into collaboration Murray helped revise Shaw s Major Barbara in which he appears as a character and discussion of a vast range of issues ranging from alphabet reform and psychic phenomena to the League of Nations and international politics Bernard Shaw Hesketh Pearson,2019-01-13 George Bernard Shaw 1856 1950 known at his insistence simply as Bernard Shaw was an Irish playwright critic polemicist and political activist His influence on Western theatre culture and politics extended from the 1880s to his death and beyond In 1901 Max Beerbohm wrote of Bernard Shaw As a personality he is immortal Bernard Shaw worked with renowned English actor director and author Hesketh Pearson in the writing of this great biography which was first published in 1942 Drawing on Shaw s recorded conversations the book comes alive with the gaiety and magnetism of this great man His harsh writings as a music critic His writings to Ellen Terry His discussions with Sydney and Beatrice Webb His long preoccupation with death and of course his revolutionary contribution to English theatre All the many facets of Shaw s character are drawn on in this fascinating biography Shaw s own words are used as often as possible not only to explain his thoughts but also to show the lucid succinct way in which he expressed them From its pages G B S emerges as large as life and if possible twice as natural Professor C E M Joad Shaw Gale K. Larson,2001 SHAW 21 offers readers an eclectic perspective on Shaw his works and his contemporaries Basil Langton actor and director reminisces about his early development as an actor his meeting with Shaw and his career as director of many of Shaw s plays He focuses upon Shaw s stagecraft augmenting his views with those of Sybil Thorndike and Sir Lewis Casson whom he interviewed in 1960 Galen Goodwin Longstreth analyzes the correspondence between Shaw and Ellen Terry and argues that the exchange is itself a literary genre a dramatic performance that reveals their personal identities The next two contributors Stanley Weintraub and Andrea Adolph examine the Shaw Virginia Woolf relationship Weintraub focuses on those occasions when their respective lives touched each other what their feelings for each other were and how those occasions were obliquely woven into Shaw s plays most notably Heartbreak House Professor Adolph argues that in Woolf s only dramatic text Freshwater A Comedy she was conforming to the traditional theatrical mode of the day dominated of course by Shaw but that she subverted his traditional literary depiction of paternity as for example the paternity dramatized in Major Barbara Sidney Albert and Bernard Dukore provide unique perspectives on reading Major Barbara Albert shows how John Bunyan s The Pilgrim s Progress serves as Shaw s source for Barbara s progress toward enlightened understanding Dukore focusing on the

perspective of the familial relationship within the play concludes that Shaw's dialectic gives the kids the future and not the dad. It will be the next generation, not Father Undershaft, who will determine where society will go next. Julie Sparks and Martin Bucco approach Shaw from a comparative basis, juxtaposing him with two American writers contemporaries of Shaw: Mark Twain and Sinclair Lewis respectively. Sparks explores the commonality that exists in Shaw's and Twain's thinking about evolution, namely their heretical visions of a post-Darwinian Eden. Both viewed conventional Christianity iconoclastically but both arrived at different conclusions about human origin and destiny: a view Sparks describes as emanating from the deist pessimist evolutionary determinist perspective versus the mystic optimistic creative evolutionist perspective or the Personal Godhead versus the Impersonal Force. Professor Bucco enumerates the many references Sinclair Lewis makes to Bernard Shaw throughout his writings, both prose and fiction, to underscore the American novelist's admiration for the Irish playwright, both recipients of the Nobel Prize for Literature. The final two contributors to SHAW 21, Rodelle Weintraub and William Doan, provide the readers with distinctive perspectives on *John Bull's Other Island* and *The Doctor's Dilemma* respectively. Weintraub recasts the play into a dream sequence whereby Doyle's dream becomes an artifice for problem solving. Implied within Father Keegan's lines in the play, "Every dream is a prophecy, every jest is an earnest in the womb of Time is the resolution of Doyle's problem with Nora, the girl he had left behind, and of the dream of modernizing Roscullen." Doan suggests that in *The Doctor's Dilemma*, Shaw uses the idea of unconsummated adultery to argue for the efficacy of art over science. In the conflict between the artist and the scientist, the latter plans to have the artist's muse. In the end, not only is he deprived of the wife but also of the works of art themselves and the spirit that animates them. SHAW 21 also includes three reviews of recent additions to Shavian scholarship as well as John R. Pfeiffer's *Continuing Checklist of Shaviana*. English Theatre in Transition 1881-1914 James Woodfield, 2015-07-16. Originally published in 1984. The turn of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries was a time of considerable change in the English theatre. Victorian attitudes were shocked or shattered by the new drama of Ibsen; the major figure of George Bernard Shaw dominated the period; theatre censorship was the subject of a long and furious contest; and staging conventions changed from the spectacular stylings of Irving and Beerbohm Tree to the masking and statuesque styles of Isadora Duncan and the inner realism of Stanislavsky. This book traces the activities of the leading figures in the English theatre, notably William Archer, who introduced Ibsen to this country and who became one of the main promoters of the idea of a National Theatre. Other personalities discussed include Harley Granville Barker, particularly his association with Shaw at the Court Theatre, and his part in campaigns against censorship and for changes in the staging of Shakespeare; and Edward Gordon Craig, whose rebellion against the Victorian theatre took an anti-realist direction. This is a stimulating account of the background to the modern English theatre, which can only increase appreciation of its standard and variety. Innes, 2002-01-04 A Sourcebook on Naturalist Theatre provides essential primary sources which document one of the key movements in modern theatre Christopher Innes has selected three writers to exemplify the movement and six plays in particular Henrik Ibsen A Dolls House and Hedda Gabler Anton Chekhov The Seagull and The Cherry Orchard George Bernard Shaw Mrs Warren s Profession and Heartbreak House Innes introduction provides an overview of naturalist theatre Key themes include the representation of women significant contemporary issues and the links between theory play writing and stage practice The primary sources explore many aspects of naturalism giving information on the playwrights intentions when writing plays contemporary reviews literary criticism political and social background production notes from early performances of the plays **Bernard Shaw's Arms and the Man** Bernard Shaw, 1982 In this promptbook for Arms and the Man a composite of notes from four productions directed either wholly or principally by Bernard Shaw Bernard F Dukore adds another dimension to the Irishman known primarily as a playwright wit and critic Shaw according to Dukore consistently maintained that directing plays is as crucial a part of a dramatist s profession as writing them He took his role as director quite seriously exerting almost total control over the production He cast his own plays directed them and even advised on such production matters as lights music the use of stage machinery and the type and placement of props When German director Max Reinhardt made an unauthorized cut in one of Shaw s plays Shaw protested May the soul of Reinhardt scream through all eternity in boiling brimstone The core of this book comes from the production notes of the 1894 premier of Arms and the Man but notes from the 1907 1911 and 1919 performances are included as well Dukore has made this a composite promptbook rather than a record of a single performance for two reasons no clear evidence enables him to determine which production the comments pertain to and Shaw s interpretation of the play did not change over the years although he did refine certain aspects Dukore describes his text and his method of arriving at it The directorial comments that face the text derive chiefly from Shaw s rehearsal notes In addition I have employed sketches and notes for blocking copied from Shaw s markings in the margins of the 1905 and 1908 printings of the play extracts from Shaw s letters to Alma

Murray and Lillah MacCarthy the Rainas of the 1894 and 1907 productions respectively and the undated Instructions to Producer of Arms and the Man The letters and instructions are identified when they appear Cast lists with credits for director and designer where known of these three productions and of the 1919 production follow The play text Dukore used is the second revised printing of volume 1 of the Bodley Head edition of Shaw's plays 1979 This is the second volume of a Special Issue series published in cooperation with the American Society for Theatre Research The first was Edward Gordon Craig and The Pretenders A Production Revisited by Frederick J Marker and Lise Lone Marker
