Bertrand Russell's Ethics Michael K. Potter, 2006-02-15 Bertrand Russell was not only one of the greatest philosophers of the twentieth century he was also a humanitarian and activist who fought for many moral social and political causes During his lifetime the general public knew him for his activism and popular works in which he tackled such diverse topics as sexual ethics religion war and nuclear disarmament Besides the great achievements in mathematical logic on which his reputation rests Russell was a pioneer in moral philosophy and his work in this area informed and guided his activism Russell created one of the first versions of a meta ethical theory known as emotivism sometimes also called the boo hooray theory later popularized by A.J. Ayer and C.L. Stevenson which maintains that ethical statements cannot be true or false they are simply expressions of emotional attitudes That Russell could hold such a theory while being at the same time an ardent activist is one feat That his version was superior to more popular versions of emotivism is another Yet despite the fact that Russell held on to some form of emotivism for most of his professional life and despite the fact that the theory is present in some of his best known books it was virtually ignored until the late 1990s Michael K Potter's book brings an important new dimension to our understanding of Russell's life his activism and his contribution to moral philosophy Wittgenstein and the Theory of Perception Justin Good, 2010-12-16 **Thomas Reid's Ethics** William C. Davis, 2006-10-24 Thomas Reid 1710 96 was one of the most daring and original thinkers of the eighteenth century His work became the cornerstone of the Scottish School of Common Sense Philosophy and was highly influential in nineteenth century America it also anticipated the thinking of such twentieth century figures as Moore and Wittgenstein Now after a long period of neglect his philosophy is again the subject of increasing attention across the world For Reid knowing about ethics is a matter of having good evidence supplied by a sense like moral faculty William Davis s book shows how such a view can be both consistent and plausible in the twenty first century Thomas Reid's Ethics begins by characterizing the state of moral epistemology at the time when Reid was writing It goes on to recount Reid's central claims about the moral sense and describes the various problems that confront those who would explain and defend his views Davis lays the foundation for resolving these difficulties by detailing an epistemological conception of evidence which parallels the legal conception of evidence used by the Scottish courts of Reid's day He then shows how Reid's claims about evidence and self evidence are best understood in light of this legal model. The book concludes by responding to recent worries about moral sense theories and offers a final assessment of the success of Reid s ethical project The book will be of substantial interest not only to Reid scholars and historians of philosophy but also to specialists and students in contemporary ethics **Russell's Theory of Perception** Sajahan Miah, 2006-05-30 In Russell s Theory of Perception Sajahan Miah re examines and evaluates the development of Russell's concept of perception and the relation of perception to our knowledge of the external world With the introduction of logical construction in which physical objects are constructed from actual and possible sense data Russell's theory of perception seems to become a causal theory

with phenomenalist overtones The book argues that there is a consistency of purpose and direction which motivated Russell to introduce logical construction The purpose was to strike a compromise between his empiricism and his realism and to establish a bridge between the objects of perception and the objects of physics and common sense Wittgenstein's Religious Point of View Tim Labron, 2006-09-01 Wittgenstein once said I cannot help seeing every problem from a religious point of view However since he never advocated any one religion many people have wondered just what this religious point of view could be This book answers this question by clarifying the overall nature s of his philosophies the early and the later and then by exploring the idea of a religious point of view as an analogy for a philosophy As a result the author reveals the concordance between the later Wittgenstein and central aspects of Hebraic thought Although perhaps this ought not to be surprising Wittgenstein himself described his thought as one hundred per cent Hebraic the truth of the matter has been obscured by popular supposition that Wittgenstein was anti Semitic The Philosophy of Herbert Spencer Michael Taylor, 2010-07-15 Herbert Spencer 1820 1903 is remembered today only as an alleged Social Darwinist who applied the theory of the survival of the fittest to society Yet he was among the most influential and widely read philosophers of the nineteenth century There were few Victorian thinkers and scientists who did not know his work and who did not formulate their own positions partly in reaction to his Michael Taylor's book provides the only detailed and reliable modern survey of the whole corpus of Spencer's thought Taylor introduces a Spencer very different to his posthumous reputation not primarily a political philosopher but the architect of a comprehensive philosophical system that aimed to demonstrate the inevitability of human perfection through universal natural laws He also locates the Synthetic Philosophy firmly in its place and time by showing how it developed out of the concerns of a group of like minded British writers and thinkers during the 1850s This book will be of interest to historians of philosophy and of science to social scientists to scholars and students of nineteenth century literature and to anyone who wishes to understand one of most important figures in Victorian intellectual life

Francis Bacon and the Limits of Scientific Knowledge Dennis Desroches,2006-09-15 While Francis Bacon continues to be considered the father of modern experimental science his writings are no longer given close attention by most historians and philosophers of science let alone by scientists themselves In this new book Dennis Desroches speaks up loudly for Bacon showing how we have yet to surpass the fundamental theoretical insights that he offered towards producing scientific knowledge The book first examines the critics who have led many generations of scholars in fields as diverse as literary criticism science studies feminism philosophy and history to think of Bacon as an outmoded landmark in the history of ideas rather than a crucial thinker for our own day Bacon's own work is seen to contain the best responses to these various forms of attack Desroches then focuses on Bacon's Novum Organum The

The final part of the book draws startling links between Bacon and one of the twentieth century s most important historians philosophers of science Thomas Kuhn discerning in Kuhn s work a reprise of many of Bacon s fundamental ideas despite Kuhn s clear attempt to reject Bacon as a significant contributor to the way we think about scientific practice today Desroches concludes then that Bacon was not simply the father of modern science he is still in the process of fathering it The Cultural Politics of Analytic Philosophy Thomas L.
