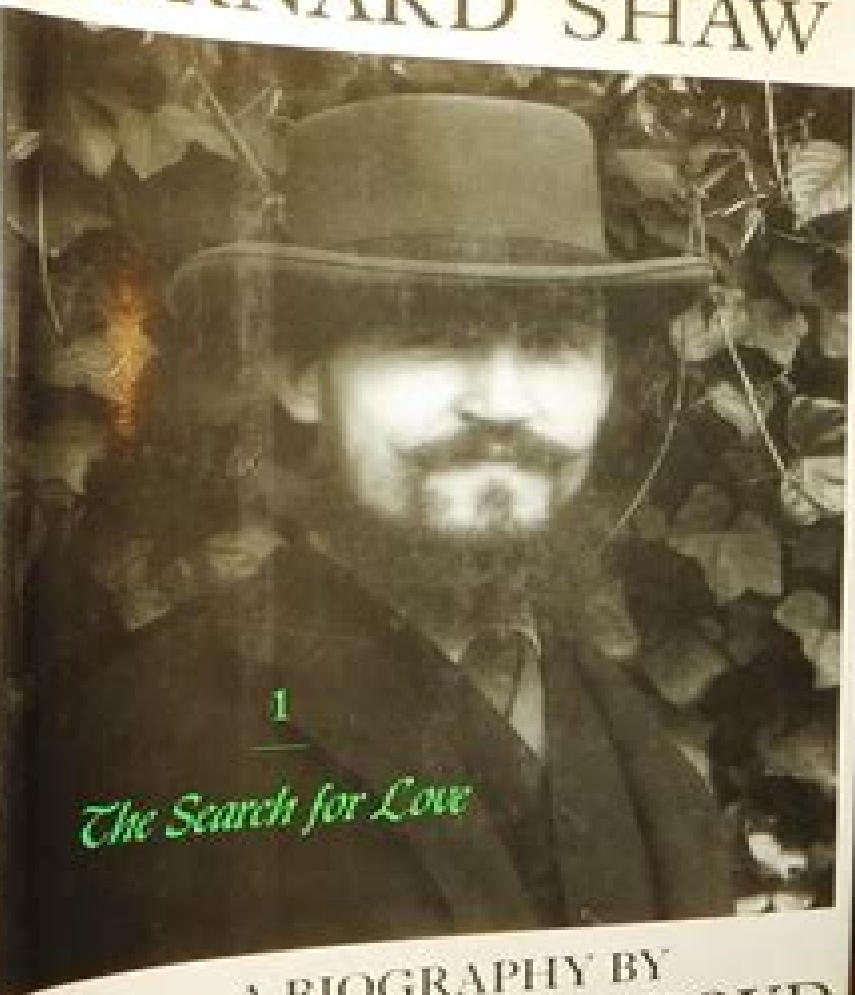

It also connects Shaw's own experiences of love and marriage to the themes that emerge in his works showing how his personal relationships in and out of matrimonial bonds change the ways his characters enter and exit marriages and misalliances. While providing a wealth of new analysis, this collection of essays also leaves lingering questions for the reader to spark continuing dialogue in both individual and academic settings.

Bernard Shaw's Book Reviews Brian Tyson, 2008-01-31 These hitherto uncollected book reviews of Shaw's first journalistic efforts reveal much not only about the writer but also the culture of the time in which he lived. Between 1885 and 1888 Bernard Shaw published 111 book reviews in the Pall Mall Gazette. In spite of their importance as the first regular journalism Shaw wrote and the fact that the books, fiction, nonfiction, plays, and poetry he read during these years must have formed the nucleus of his permanent library, the reviews have never before been analyzed in connection with Shaw's work. Brian Tyson has assembled the book reviews complete with the books' titles, authors, and a brief biography of each author, including any comments Shaw made about the review, and has placed them in historical context, elucidating any interesting, difficult, or obscure references. Tyson's critical introduction places the reviews in the context of Shaw's work and Victorian society. The reviews are often characterized by the wit and brilliance that we associate with the later Shaw, shedding light on his development as a writer at his most formative stage. Regardless of the merits of the material Shaw was reviewing, it is amusing and enlightening to follow him down to the wandering tributaries of Late Victorian fiction and poetry, which reveal as much about Shaw as they do about the preoccupations and prejudices of the average reader of the day.

Bernard Shaw's and Virginia Woolf's Interior Authors Lagretta Tallent Lenker, 2024-05-09 Virginia Woolf and Bernard Shaw may be the odd couple of Twentieth Century modernism. Despite their difference in age, Shaw was twenty-six years older than Woolf, and public demeanor, Shaw sought public attention while Woolf shunned the spotlight, they actively held similar convictions on most of the pressing and controversial issues of the day. This book demonstrates that both engaged in social reform through the Fabian Society, both took public anti-war positions and paid dearly for it, both fought British censorship throughout most of their careers as writers, both sought to strengthen women's rights, and both endeavored to revolutionize their respective art forms, believing that art could bring about positive social change. The main focus of the book, however, concerns how both also created interior authors: characters who write and who either self-censor their own works or highly publicized messages or are censored by their fellow characters. These fictional authors, maybe considered reflections of their creators and their respective milieus, and serve to illuminate the satisfactions and torments of each famous author.

The search for supernatural wisdom forms a constant thread traced through Yeats's occult notebooks and closely related to the insecurities of his personal life. *The Apprentice Mage* charts the growth of a poet's mind and of an astonishing personality, both of which were instrumental in the formation of a new and radicalised Irish nationalist identity.

It is generally assumed that the language of patriotism and national identity belongs to the political right, but the emergence of socialism in the 1880s shows clearly that the left also drew on such ideas in its formative years to legitimate a particular form of socialism, one presented as a restoration of an English past lost to industrial capitalism. The First World War dealt a severe blow to this radical patriotism, though the anti-war left continued to use radical patriotic language in the early years; the war degraded patriotism generally, while the Russian Revolution gave internationalism a new focus and also threatened the dominant concept of British socialism. Moderate Labour sought to prove their fitness to govern and concentrated on the national interest rather than oppositional Englishness, while the left of the movement looked to Soviet Russia rather than the English past for models for a future socialist society. Owen Holland, 2022-03-18 Between March and May 1871 the Parisian Communards fought for a revolutionary alternative to the status quo grounded in a vision of internationalism radical democracy and economic justice for the working masses that cut across national borders The eventual defeat and bloody suppression of the Commune resonated far beyond Paris In Britain the Commune provoked widespread and fierce condemnation while its defenders constituted a small but vocal minority The Commune evoked long standing fears about the continental spectre of revolution not least because the Communards seizure of power represented an embryonic alternative to the bourgeois social order This book examines how a heterogeneous group of authors in Britain responded to the Commune In doing so it provides the first full length critical study of the reception and representation of the Commune in Britain during the closing decades of the nineteenth century showing how discussions of the Commune functioned as a screen to project hope and fear serving as a warning for some and an example to others Writers considered in the book include John Ruskin Edward Bulwer Lytton Eliza Lynn Linton Mary Elizabeth Braddon Anne Thackeray Ritchie Margaret Oliphant George Gissing Henry James William Morris Alfred Austin and H G Wells As the book shows many but not all of these writers responded to the Commune with literary strategies that sought to stabilize bourgeois subjectivity in the wake of the traumatic shock of a revolutionary event The book extends critical understanding of the Commune s cultural afterlives and explores the relationship between literature and revolution

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
