Art and Revolution Richard Wagner, William Ashton Ellis, 2008-10 Wilhelm Richard Wagner 1813 1883 was a German composer conductor music theorist and essayist primarily known for his operas later called music dramas Wagner's musical style is often considered the epitome of classical music's Romantic period due to its unprecedented exploration of emotional expression He transformed musical thought through his idea of Gesamtkunstwerk total artwork the synthesis of all the poetic visual musical and dramatic arts epitomized by his monumental four opera cycle The Ring of the Niebelung 1876 Wagner even went so far as to build his own opera house to try to stage these works as he had imagined them His literary friendship with Franz Liszt led to a long lived correspondence later compiled in the two volumes of Correspondence of Wagner and Liszt 1889 a book that was attributed to both musicians Among his other famous works are Tristan and Isolde which broke important new musical ground My Life in two volumes 1880 and The Flying Dutchman
