Pérez, Francisca Pérez-Carreño, 2010-02-19 The performing arts represent a significant part of the artistic production in our culture Correspondingly the fields of drama film music opera dance and performance studies are expanding However these arts remain an underexplored territory for aesthetics and the philosophy of art Expression in the Performing Arts tries to contribute to this area The volume collects essays written by international scholars who address a variety of themes concerning the core philosophical topic of expression in the theory of the performing arts Specific questions about the ontology of art the nature of the performances the role of the performer and the relations between spectators and works emerge from the study of the performing arts Besides these arts challenge the unchanging physicality of other kinds of works of art usually the direct result of creative individual artist and barely affected by the particular circumstances of their exhibition Expression is one of the issues that adopt a special character in the performing arts Do singers dancers or actors express the feelings a work is expressive of How does the performer contribute to the expressive content of the work How does the spectator emotionally respond to the physical proximity of the performers Is aesthetic distance avoided in the understanding of the performing arts How are the expressive properties of work performance and characters related And how are the subjectivities they embody revealed The contributions presented here are not all in agreement on the right answers to these questions but they offer a critical and exciting discussion of them In addition to original proposals on the theoretical aspect of expression in the performing arts the collection includes analyses of individual artists historical productions and concrete works of art as well as reflections on performative practice

Tilghman, 2012-12-06 The philosophy of art aesthetics is here understood to be something distinct from both art appreciation and art criticism The philosophy of art is nevertheless dependent upon the existence of appreciation and criticism because it is out of reflection upon these that the uniquely philosophical problems of art arise problems that reflect puzzlement about what is involved in understanding enjoying describing and evaluating works of art Hence the philosophy of art must presuppose at least some measure of understanding and appreciation of particular works of art and if such understanding and appreciation are lacking the philosopher is in no position to supply them It can not be a philosophical task to undertake a Defense of Poesie against either the philistine or the tyrant The philosopher is not the one to convince us that art is a Good Thing that paintings are worth looking at poems worth reading and music worth listening to if for no other reason than that philosophical theory and argument are no substitute for taste and sensibility My position here is the now unexceptional one that philosophical problems are essentially conceptual problems and while the philosopher of art cannot produce aesthetic sensibility and

appreciation where these do not exist he can give us understanding of the concepts relevant to artistic appreciation and thereby help us to see our way through the conceptual confusions that have generated the philosophical puzzles surrounding art its appreciation and criticism

Drawing as Expression Sandy Brooke, 2002 Human communication is grounded in fundamentally cooperative even shared intentions In this original and provocative account of the evolutionary origins of human communication Michael Tomasello connects the fundamentally cooperative structure of human communication initially discovered by Paul Grice to the especially cooperative structure of human as opposed to other primate social interaction Tomasello argues that human cooperative communication rests on a psychological infrastructure of shared intentionality joint attention common ground evolved originally for collaboration and culture more generally The basic motives of the infrastructure are helping and sharing humans communicate to request help inform others of things helpfully and share attitudes as a way of bonding within the cultural group These cooperative motives each created different functional pressures for conventionalizing grammatical constructions Requesting help in the immediate you and me and here and now for example required very little grammar but informing and sharing required increasingly complex grammatical devices Drawing on empirical research into gestural and vocal communication by great apes and human infants much of it conducted by his own research team Tomasello argues further that humans cooperative communication emerged first in the natural gestures of pointing and pantomiming Conventional communication first gestural and then vocal evolved only after humans already possessed these natural gestures and their shared intentionality infrastructure along with skills of cultural learning for creating and passing along jointly understood communicative conventions Challenging the Chomskian view that linguistic knowledge is innate Tomasello proposes instead that the most fundamental aspects of uniquely human communication are biological adaptations for cooperative social interaction in general and that the purely linguistic dimensions of human communication are cultural conventions and constructions created by and passed along within particular cultural groups
