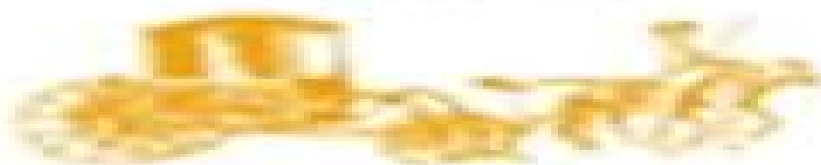

book with an impressive description of the ranching empire of Power's nephew Thomas O'Connor. In between he examines the marriages, commercial contacts, political alliances, and language ties that Mexicanized these successful entrepreneurs. Living in the heart of the war zone, some of the Irish settlers fought for independence while others remained loyal to the Mexican government that had made them citizens and given them land. Davis offers a vivid picture of the hardships of pioneer life and the building of communities, churches, and schools. He describes how Irish ranchers had the opportunity to thrive after the annexation of Texas and emphasizes their willing acceptance of Mexican ranching methods. He makes a convincing case that the Irish came to Texas not as victims but as entrepreneurs and opportunists in search of land.

During the late eighteenth century, antiquaries in Ireland, Scotland, and Wales answered modernization and anglicization initiatives with nationalist arguments for cultural preservation. Responding in particular to Enlightenment dismissals of Gaelic oral traditions, they reconceived national and literary history under the sign of the bard. Their pathbreaking models of national and literary history, their new way of reading national landscapes, and their debates about tradition and cultural transmission shaped a succession of new novelistic genres from Gothic and sentimental fiction to

the national tale and the historical novel In Ireland and Scotland these genres were used to mount nationalist arguments for cultural specificity and against internal colonization Yet once exported throughout the nascent British empire they also formed the basis of the first colonial fiction of Canada Australia and British India used not only to attack imperialism but to justify the imperial project Literary forms intended to shore up national memory paradoxically become the means of buttressing imperial ideology and enforcing imperial amnesia

The Great Famine Ciarán Ó Murchadha, 2011-06-02 Over one million people died in the Great Famine and more than one million more emigrated on the coffin ships to America and beyond Drawing on contemporary eyewitness accounts and diaries the book charts the arrival of the potato blight in 1845 and the total destruction of the harvests in 1846 which brought a sense of numbing shock to the populace Far from meeting the relief needs of the poor the Liberal public works programme was a first example of how relief policies would themselves lead to mortality Workhouses were swamped with thousands who had subsisted on public works and soup kitchens earlier and who now gathered in ragged crowds Unable to cope workhouse staff were forced to witness hundreds die where they lay outside the walls The next phase of degradation was the clearances or exterminations in popular parlance which took place on a colossal scale From late 1847 an exodus had begun The Famine slowly came to an end from late 1849 but the longer term consequences were to reverberate through future decades
