## **Algebraic Extensions Of Fields 2nd Edition:**

Local Fields and Their Extensions: Second Edition Ivan B. Fesenko, S. V. Vostokov, 2002-07-17 This book offers a modern exposition of the arithmetical properties of local fields using explicit and constructive tools and methods. It has been ten years since the publication of the first edition and according to Mathematical Reviews 1 000 papers on local fields have been published during that period. This edition incorporates improvements to the first edition with 60 additional pages reflecting several aspects of the developments in local number theory. The volume consists of four parts: elementary properties of local fields, class field theory for various types of local fields and generalizations, explicit formulas for the Hilbert pairing and Milnor groups of fields and of local fields. The first three parts essentially simplify, revise and update the first edition. The book includes the following recent topics: Fontaine-Wintenberger theory of arithmetically profinite extensions and fields of norms, explicit noncohomological approach to the reciprocity map with a review of all other approaches to local class field theory, Fesenko's class field theory for local fields with perfect residue field, simplified updated presentation of Vostokov's explicit formulas for the Hilbert norm residue symbol and Milnor groups of local fields. Numerous exercises introduce the reader to other important recent results in local number theory and an extensive bibliography provides a guide to related areas.

*Course On Abstract Algebra, A (Second Edition)* Minking Eie, Shou-te Chang, 2017-09-13 This textbook provides an introduction to abstract algebra for advanced undergraduate students. Based on the authors' notes at the Department of Mathematics, National Chung Cheng University, it contains material sufficient for three semesters of study. It begins with a description of the algebraic structures of the ring of integers and the field of rational numbers. Abstract groups are then introduced. Technical results such as Lagrange's theorem and Sylow's theorems follow as applications of group theory. The theory of rings and ideals forms the second part of this textbook, with the ring of integers, the polynomial rings and matrix rings as basic examples. Emphasis will be on factorization in a factorial domain. The final part of the book focuses on field extensions and Galois theory to illustrate the correspondence between Galois groups and splitting fields of separable polynomials. Three whole new chapters are added to this second edition: Group action is introduced to give a more in-depth discussion on Sylow's theorems; We also provide a formula in solving combinatorial problems as an application; We devote two chapters to module theory which is a natural generalization of the theory of the vector spaces. Readers will see the similarity and subtle differences between the two. In particular, determinant is formally defined and its properties rigorously proved. The textbook is more accessible and less ambitious than most existing books covering the same subject. Readers will also find the pedagogical material very useful in enhancing the teaching and learning of abstract algebra. *Abstract Algebra:*

However, the presentation of the material has been extensively revised and improved. In addition, there are two new chapters: one dealing with the fundamental theorem of finitely generated

of my favorite mathematical subjects and I wrote a crude form of lecture notes that semester Those notes sat undisturbed for three years until late in 1993 when I finally made the decision to turn the notes into a book The notes were greatly expanded and rewritten and they were in a form sufficient to be used as the text for Math 581 when I taught it again in the fall of 1994 Part of my desire to write a textbook was due to the nonstandard format of our graduate algebra sequence The first semester of our sequence is field theory Our graduate students generally pick up group and ring theory in a senior level course prior to taking field theory Since we start with field theory we would have to jump into the middle of most graduate algebra textbooks This can make reading the text difficult by not knowing what the author did before the field theory chapters Therefore a book devoted to field theory is desirable for us as a text While there are a number of field theory books around most of these were less complete than I wanted
