1988 Caroline Coon, 1982-01-01 Follows the rise of such eminent punk groups as The Sex Pistols The Damned and The Stranglers and discusses the appeal of their violent nihilistic music **The Lost Women of Rock Music** Helen Reddington, 2016-09-17 In Britain during the late 1970s and early 1980s a new phenomenon emerged with female guitarists bass players keyboard players and drummers playing in bands Before this time women's presence in rock bands with a few notable exceptions had always been as vocalists This sudden influx of female musicians into the male domain of rock music was brought about partly by the enabling ethic of punk rock anybody can do it and partly by the impact of the Equal Opportunities Act But just as suddenly as the phenomenon arrived the interest in these musicians evaporated and other priorities became important to music audiences Helen Reddington investigates the social and commercial reasons for how these women became lost from the rock music record and rewrites this period in history in the context of other periods when female musicians have been visible in previously male environments Reddington draws on her own experience as bass player in a punk band thereby contributing a fresh perspective on the socio political context of the punk scene and its relationship with the media The book also features a wealth of original interview material with key protagonists including the late John Peel Geoff Travis The Raincoats and the Poison Girls *The End of the Century Party* Steve Redhead, 1990 This book offers an alternative perspective on popular music and youth culture in the 1980s and beyond Based on interviews with disc jockeys record label owners musicians producers and fans it describes and analyses the shift from New Pop in the early 1980s to what it calls Political Pop in the mid late 1980s From synopsis [There Ain't No Black in the Union Jack](#) Paul Gilroy, 2013-10-18 This classic book is a powerful indictment of contemporary attitudes to race By accusing British intellectuals and politicians on both sides of the political divide of refusing to take race seriously Paul Gilroy caused immediate uproar when this book was first published in 1987 A brilliant and explosive exploration of racial discourses There Ain't No Black in the Union Jack provided a powerful new direction for race relations in Britain Still dynamite today and as relevant as ever this Routledge Classics edition includes a new introduction by the author **Seditious Theology** Mark Johnson, 2016-04-01 Seditious Theology explores the much analysed British punk movement of the 1970s from a theological perspective Imaginatively engaging with subjects such as subversion deconstruction confrontation and sedition this book highlights the stark contrasts between the punk genre and the ministry of Jesus while revealing surprising similarities and in so doing demonstrates how we may look at both subjects in fresh and unusual ways Johnson looks at both punk and Jesus and their challenges to symbols gestures of revolt constructive use of conflict and the shattering of relational norms He then points to the seditious pattern in Jesus' life and the way it can be discerned in some recent trends in theology The imaginative images that he creates provide a challenging image of Jesus and of those who have relooked radically in recent years at what being a seditious follower of Christ means for the church Introducing both a new partner for theological conversation and a

Dark Horse Records Aaron Badgley, 2024-11-06 In 1974 with Apple winding down George Harrison still aspired to help new artists so rather than trying to salvage Apple he set up his own label Dark Horse Records on a much smaller scale His plan was to release records from new artists as well as some of his old friends with an eye to eventually releasing his own music While Dark Horse had an encouraging beginning with a hit single from Splinter the label suffered increasing problems failing to establish itself in the way Harrison hoped However some incredible and varied music was created from 1974 to 1977 including some of Harrison's best solo material Towards the end of its initial life Dark Horse dropped most of its artists and released mainly Harrison's solo work Thankfully since 2020 Dhani Harrison has taken the reins and has made Dark Horse viable once again signing Cat Stevens and Billy Idol and releasing music from Joe Strummer and Leon Russell Finally in 2023 it was announced that Harrison's entire solo catalog was going to be re-released on Dark Horse This book tells the story of the label from the beginning through its struggles and on to its exciting renaissance in the new millennium At a very young age Aaron Badgley developed a profound love of The Beatles and music in general also developing a fascination with record labels At the age of 19 he started working in radio and by the age of 20 he was a production manager for a number of stations in Canada In 2005 he debuted his syndicated radio show The Beatles Universe which ran for six years Currently he is the host of Here Today and Backwards Traveller radio shows and co-hosts From Memphis To Merseyside and The Way Back Music Machine with Tony Stuart He writes for Spill Magazine and Immersive Audio Album He has also contributed to the All Music Guide Aaron resides in Toronto Canada

Stealing All Transmissions Randal Doane, 2014-10-15 Stealing All Transmissions is a love story It s the story of how The Clash fell in love with America and how America loved them back The romance began in full in 1977 when select rock journalists and deejays aided the band s quest to depose the rock of indolence that dominated American airwaves This history situates The Clash amid the cultural skirmishes of the 1970s and culminates with their September 1979 performance at the Palladium in New York City This concert was broadcast live on WNEW and it concluded with Paul Simonon treating his Fender bass like a woodcutter s ax This performance produced one of the most exhilarating Clash bootleg recordings and the photo of Simonon s outburst which graced the cover of the *London Calling* LP was recently deemed the greatest rock n roll photograph of all time That night marked one of the last opportunities for American audiences to see The Clash as a punk band teetering between conviction and uncertainty before they became a seriously brilliant rock group Stealing represents a distinctive take on the history of punk for no other book gives proper attention to the forces of free form radio long form rock journalism or Clash bootleg recordings many of which are now widely available on the web This story which takes its title from the 1981 single *Radio Clash* includes original interviews with key figures from the New York punk scene This secret history concludes with an analysis of how we listen to music today and its impact on the written word

When Music Migrates Jon Stratton, 2016-02-17 When Music Migrates uses rich material to examine the ways that music has crossed racial faultlines that have developed in the post Second World War era as a consequence of the movement of previously colonized peoples to the countries that colonized them This development which can be thought of in terms of diaspora can also be thought of as postmodern in that it reverses the modern flow which took colonizers and sometimes settlers from European countries to other places in the world Stratton explores the concept of song careers referring to how a song is picked up and then transformed by being revisioned by different artists and in different cultural contexts The idea of the song career extends the descriptive term *cover* in order to examine the transformations a song undergoes from artist to artist and cultural context to cultural context Stratton focuses on the British faultline between the post war African Caribbean settlers and the white Britons Central to the book is the question of identity For example how African Caribbean people have constructed their identity in Britain can be considered through an examination of when *Police on My Back* was written and how it has been revisioned by Lethal Bizzle in its most recent iteration At the same time this song written by the Guyanese

migrant Eddy Grant for his mixed race group The Equals crossed the racial faultline when it was picked up by the punk rock group The Clash Conversely Johnny Reggae originally a pop ska track written about a skinhead by Jonathan King and performed by a group of studio artists whom King named The Piglets was revisioned by a Jamaican studio group called The Roosevelt Singers After this the character of Johnny Reggae takes on a life of his own and appears in tracks by Jamaican toasters as a Rastafarian Johnny's identity is then totally transformed It is this migration of music that will appeal not only to those studying popular music but

Between Montmartre and the Mudd Club Bernard Gendron, 2023-08-31 During the late nineteenth and early twentieth century popular music was considered nothing but vulgar entertainment Today jazz and rock music are seen as forms of art and their practitioners are regularly accorded a status on par with the cultural and political elite To take just one recent example Bono lead singer and lyricist of the rock band U2 got equal and sometimes higher billing than Pope John Paul II on their shared efforts in the Jubilee 2000 debt relief project When and how did popular music earn so much cultural capital To find out Bernard Gendron investigates five key historical moments when popular music and avant-garde art transgressed the rigid boundaries separating high and low culture to form friendly alliances He begins at the end of the nineteenth century in Paris's Montmartre district where cabarets showcased popular music alongside poetry readings in spaces decorated with modernist art works Two decades later Parisian poets and musicians slumming in jazz clubs assimilated jazz's aesthetics in their performances and compositions In the bebop revolution in mid-1940s America jazz returned the compliment by absorbing modernist devices and postures in effect transforming itself into an avant-garde art form Mid-1960s rock music under the leadership of the Beatles went from being reviled as vulgar music to being acclaimed as a cutting edge art form Finally Gendron takes us to the Mudd Club in the late 1970s where New York punk and new wave rockers were setting the aesthetic

agenda for a new generation of artists Between Montmartre and the Mudd Club should be on the shelves of anyone interested in the intersections between high and low culture art and music or history and aesthetics **Rock Eras** James M.
