*Displayed Spaces* Roberto Gigliotti, 2015 Why do we organise architecture exhibitions Conventional shows contexts displaying documentation technical drawings three dimensional models photographs and videos frameworks where sketches and drawings are treated as if they were paintings models as if they were sculptures and photographs idealising what they depict within strangely uninhabited landscapes are contrasted by practices of display that focus on a different kind of investigation and offer an uncharacteristic way of involving the public with the show by means of spatial solutions within the exhibition space The attitude that characterises the traditional approach to architecture exhibitions inevitably generates a distinction between the visitors that can read and interpret the displayed objects and those who cannot Hardly any empathy is generated between the exposed objects and the subjects viewing them often these kinds of exhibitions only try to solve the problem of presenting objects that cannot be transferred into exhibitions spaces In the last years we have assisted to the diffusion of exhibitions characterised by different approaches i.e. shows in which architectural production is presented as an issue which is integrated in a broader critical context and assumes a central role from an unexpected point of view or exhibitions that concentrate on an emotional involvement of visitors who are not confronted with a specific object and its characteristics but with the transmission of an experience capable of establishing an intense relationship between the public and the content of the show In order to explore these issues this conference brings together critical contributions related to both the conception and the construction of contemporary architecture exhibitions

**Architecture and Design at the Museum of Modern Art** Thomas S. Hines, 2019-01-22 A comprehensive and

fascinating look at the history of the Museum of Modern Art's Architecture and Design Department under the leadership of the influential curator Arthur Drexler. Arthur Drexler (1921–1987) served as the curator and director of the Architecture and Design Department at the Museum of Modern Art (MoMA) from 1951 until 1986, the longest curatorship in the museum's history. Over four decades, he conceived and oversaw trailblazing exhibitions that not only reflected but also anticipated major stylistic developments. Although several books cover the roles of MoMA's founding director Alfred Barr and the department's first curator Philip Johnson, this is the only in-depth study of Drexler, who gave the department its overall shape and direction. During Drexler's tenure, MoMA played a pivotal role in examining the work and confirming the reputations of twentieth-century architects, among them Frank Lloyd Wright, Le Corbusier, Richard Neutra, Marcel Breuer, and Ludwig Mies van der Rohe. Exploring unexpected subjects from the design of automobiles and industrial objects to a reconstruction of a Japanese house and garden, Drexler's boundary pushing shows promoted new ideas about architecture and design as modern arts in contemporary society. The department's public and educational programs projected a culture of popular accessibility, offsetting MoMA's reputation as an elitist institution. Drawing on rigorous archival research as well as author Thomas S. How architectural drawings emerged as aesthetic objects promoted by a network of galleries, collectors, and institutions, and how this changed the understanding of architecture. Prior to the 1970s, buildings were commonly understood to be the goal of architectural practice; architectural drawings were seen simply as a means to an end. But just as the boundaries of architecture itself were shifting at the end of the twentieth century, the perception of architectural drawings was also shifting: they began to be seen as autonomous objects outside the process of building. In *Drawing on Architecture*, Jordan Kauffman offers an account of how architectural drawings promoted by a network of galleries and collectors, exhibitions and events, emerged as aesthetic objects and ultimately attained status as important cultural and historical artifacts, and how this was both emblematic of changes in architecture and a catalyst for these changes. Kauffman traces moments of critical importance to the evolution of the perception of architectural drawings, beginning with exhibitions that featured architectural drawings displayed in ways that did not elucidate buildings but treated them as meaningful objects in their own right. When architectural drawings were seen as having intrinsic value, they became collectible, and Kauffman chronicles early collectors, galleries, and sales. *Exhibit Kathryn Smith, 2022-07-12* The first history of Frank Lloyd Wright's exhibitions of his own work a practice central to his career More than one hundred exhibitions of Frank Lloyd Wright's work were mounted between 1894 and his death in 1959 Wright organized the majority of these exhibitions himself and viewed them as crucial to his self presentation as his extensive writings He used them to promote his designs appeal to new viewers and persuade his detractors Wright on Exhibit presents the first history of this neglected aspect of the architect's influential career Drawing extensively from Wright's unpublished correspondence Kathryn Smith challenges the preconceived notion of Wright as a self promoter who displayed his work in search of money clients and fame She shows how he was an artist architect projecting an avant garde program an innovator who expanded the palette of installation design as technology evolved and a social activist driven to revolutionize society through design While Wright's earliest exhibitions were largely for other architects by the 1930s he was creating public installations intended to inspire debate and change public perceptions about architecture The nature of his exhibitions expanded with the times beyond models drawings and photographs to include more immersive tools such as slides film and even a full scale structure built especially for his 1953 retrospective at the Guggenheim Museum Placing Wright's exhibitions side by side with his writings Smith shows how integral these exhibitions were to his vision and sheds light on the broader discourse concerning architecture and modernism during the first half of the twentieth century Wright on Exhibit features color renderings photos and plans as well as a checklist of exhibitions and an illustrated catalog of extant and lost models made under Wright's supervision
