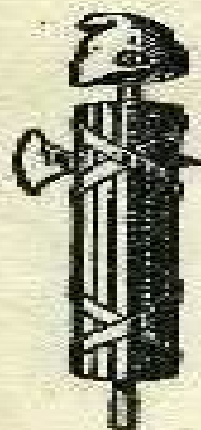


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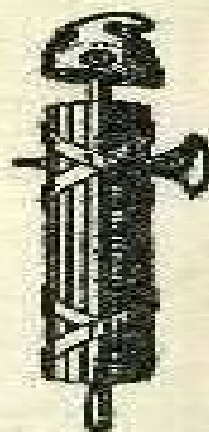

anecdotes we observe the startling juxtaposition of fundamentally different worldviews arising from two distinct religious milieus Van der Cruysse expertly weaves together material from journals memoirs and other archival documents quoting from them extensively to construct a compelling historical account of a fascinating relationship Originally published as *Louis XIV et le Siam* Fayard 1991 this English version has been ably translated by Michael Smithies author of numerous books and articles on the French involvement in Siam during the seventeenth century

*Benjamin Franklin's Vision of American Community* Lester C. Olson, 2004 Olson contends that attention to the visual images created in each of these roles dramatizes fundamental changes in Franklin's sensibility concerning British America In 1754 Franklin was an American Whig supporter of the British Empire's constitutional monarchy During the late 1750s and early 1760s he veered toward increasing the power of the Crown over Pennsylvania by changing the colony's form of government before ultimately rejecting constitutional monarchy and advocating republican politics during the 1770s and 1780s The shifts in Franklin's fundamental political commitments are among the most arresting aspects of his life Benjamin Franklin's *Vision of American Community* highlights these changes as it examines his pictorial representations of British America through several decades

*Choosing Terror* Marisa Linton, 2015-06-04 *Choosing Terror* Virtue Friendship and Authenticity in the French Revolution examines the leaders of the French Revolution Robespierre and his fellow Jacobins and particularly the gradual process whereby many of them came to choose terror These men led the Jacobin Club between 1789 and 1794 and were attempting to establish new democratic politics in France Exploring revolutionary politics through the eyes of these leaders and against a political backdrop of a series of traumatic events wars and betrayals Marisa Linton portrays the Jacobins as complex human beings who were influenced by emotions and personal loyalties as well as by their revolutionary ideology The Jacobin leaders' entire political careers were constrained by their need to be seen by their supporters as men of virtue free from corruption and ambition and concerned only with the public good In the early stages of the Revolution being seen as men of virtue empowered the Jacobin leaders and aided them in their efforts to forge their political careers However with the onset of war there was a growing conviction that political leaders who feigned virtue were the enemy within secretly conspiring with France's external enemies By Year Two the year of the Terror the Jacobin identity had become a destructive force in order to demonstrate their own authenticity they had to be seen to act virtuously and be prepared if the public good demanded it to denounce and destroy their friends and even to sacrifice their own lives This desperate thinking resulted in the politicians' terror one of the most ruthless of all forms of terror during the Revolution *Choosing Terror* seeks neither to cast blame nor to exonerate but to understand the process

propagated by Napoleon himself Here Philip Dwyer sheds new light on Napoleons inner life especially his darker side and his passion to reveal a ruthless manipulative driven man whose character has been disguised by the public image he carefully fashioned to suit the purposes of his ambition Dwyer focuses acutely on Napoleons formative years from his Corsican origins to his French education from his melancholy youth to his flirtation with radicals of the French Revolution from his first military campaigns in Italy and Egypt to the political military coup that brought him to power in 1799 One of the first truly modern politicians Napoleon was a master of spin using the media to project an idealized image of himself Dwyers biography of the young Napoleon provides a fascinating new perspective on one of the great figures of modern history *The Jacobins* Crane Brinton, 2011-08-01 Originally published New York Macmillan Co 1930 **Quatremère de Quincy** David Gilks, 2024-05-31 Antoine Chrysosth me Quatrem re de Quincy 1755 1849 was the most distinguished writer on art and architecture at the end of the enlightenment However as David Gilks shows in Quatrem re de Quincy Art and Politics during the French Revolution he was never simply an esoteric antiquarian and theoretician he was also a zealous functionary and skilled publicist whose writings on the arts often served political purposes Quatrem re de Quincy Art and Politics during the French Revolution demonstrates how Quatrem re s early writings on art and antiquity formed the foundation for a politics grounded in faith authority and hierarchy that favoured gradual social and political evolution over destruction and experimentation Gilks then traces how Quatrem re set aside his antiquarian research and became a royalist politician and publicist during the revolutionary decade Quatrem re feared that the Revolution would destroy the cosmopolitan republic of letters that had flourished when states across Europe supported the papacy s rediscovery of the past restoration of taste and revival of learning Yet Gilks reveals that Quatrem re was also a resourceful and an opportunistic political actor who deployed his opponents language for strategic reasons Gilks therefore reinterprets Quatrem re s interventions by situating them in their polemical contexts and treating them as contributions to debates and quarrels by locating his sources and reconstructing his social and political networks The resulting study revises our understanding of Quatrem re s famous reflections on the Academy of Painting and Sculpture the Panth on art plunder and museums but it also discovers and sheds light on previously ignored writings Although the study focuses on the period 1789 1799 it examines the second half of Quatrem re s life to substantiate his commitment to crown and altar and show how he fought against the Revolution s legacy of godless materialism and calculation that was inimical to the arts This is a thoroughly researched and richly detailed contextual study of the most eventful period in Quatrem re s life but it also offers an original and unfamiliar history of the French Revolution Gilks integrates the study of political power with the history of ideas and art history and provides a window into institutional and legal reforms and debates about cultural patronage and education

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
