Backing Into the Limelight Alexander Games, 2002 Alan Bennett is one of Britain's most popular living writers Alexander Games comedy critic of the Evening Standard examines the life of this private man and sheds new light on his work **Alan Bennett** Kara McKechnie, 2007 Alan Bennett is one of the UK's most well known and successful writers He has acted written directed presented or edited in almost every conceivable dramatic medium including stage print media radio film and television This book is the first to focus on his often neglected work for television from the mid 1960s right through to the present It encompasses formats such as the single play the rarely seen 1970s collaborations with Stephen Frears and Lindsay Anderson the two Talking Heads series perceived as a reinvention of the television monologue and his autobiographical documentaries While providing a context of television drama in which Bennett's output is embedded this study also provides compact overviews of his work in other media English Filming, English Writing Jefferson Hunter, 2010-04-05 Jefferson Hunter examines English films and television dramas as they relate to English culture in the 20th century He traces themes such as the influence of U S crime drama on English film and film adaptations of literary works as they appear in screen work from the 1930s to the present A Canterbury Tale and the documentary Listen to Britain are analyzed in the context of village pageants and other wartime explorations of Englishness at risk English crime dramas are set against the writings of George Orwell while a famous line from Noel Coward leads to a discussion of music and image in works like Brief Encounter and Look Back in Anger Screen adaptation is also broached in analyses of the 1985 BBC version of Dickens's Bleak House and Merchant Ivory's The Remains of the Day Contemporary Authors Lisa Kumar, 2004-06 A biographical and bibliographical guide to current writers in all fields including poetry fiction and nonfiction journalism drama television and movies Information is provided by the authors themselves or drawn from published interviews feature stories book reviews and other materials provided by the authors publishers **Edinburgh's Festivals** David Pollock, 2023-08-04 In August 1947 an migr Austrian opera impresario launched the Edinburgh International Festival of Music and Drama to heal the scars of the Second World War through a celebration of the arts At the same time a socialist theatre group from Glasgow and other amateur companies protested their exclusion from the festival by performing anyway inventing the concept of fringe theatre Now the annual celebration known collectively as the Edinburgh Festival is the largest arts festival in the world incorporating events dedicated to theatre film art literature comedy dance jazz and even military pageantry It has launched careers from Peter Cook and Dudley Moore in Beyond the Fringe to Phoebe Waller Bridge with Fleabag mirrored the political and social mood of its times shaped the city of Edinburgh around it and welcomed a huge all star cast including Orson Welles Grace Kelly Yehudi Menuhin and Mark E Smith's The Fall and many many more This is its story **Michael Reeves** Benjamin Halligan, 2003-11-08 Michael Reeves died at age 25 in 1969 between the end of Swinging London and the collapse of the British film industry an apt candidate to represent all that could have been This critical biography claims Reeves as the great
