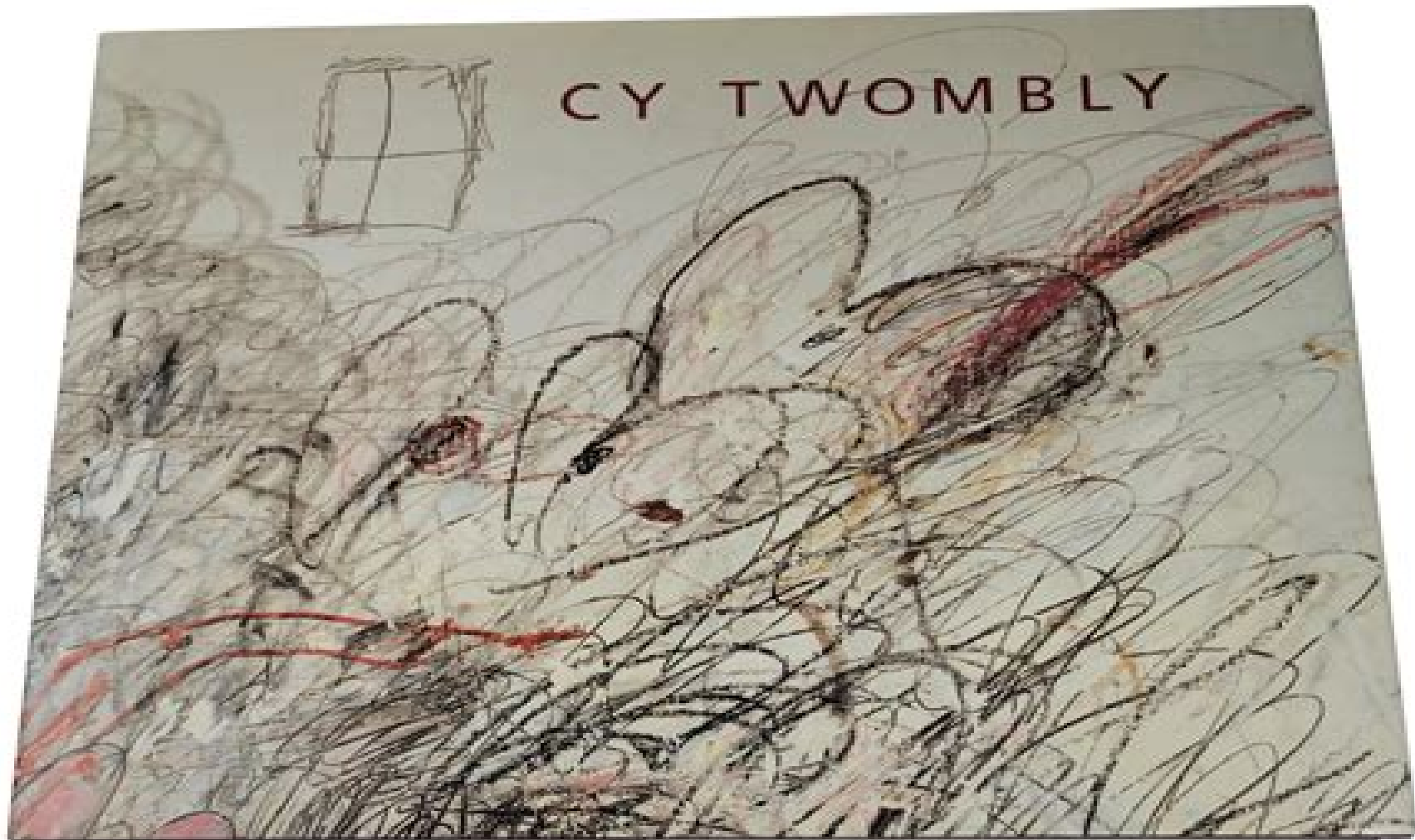

Fóti, 2020-03-01 Merleau Ponty's phenomenological ontology engages deeply with visual art and this aspect of his work remains significant not only to philosophers but also to artists art theorists and critics Until recently scholarly attention has been focused on the artists he himself was inspired by and wrote about chiefly C zanne Klee Matisse and Rodin Merleau Ponty at the Gallery expands and shifts the focus to address a range of artists Giorgio Morandi Kiki Smith Cy Twombly Joan Mitchell and Ellsworth Kelly whose work came to prominence in the

It originated from the written word described by German writers who portrayed in language what did not yet exist as art. Yet within the literature on contemporary art, little has been said about this provocative relationship. Composed of fourteen original essays, *Contemporary Art and Classical Myth* addresses this scholarly gap, exploring and in large part establishing the multifaceted intersection of contemporary art and classical myth.
