Copeland, 2000-01-01 This volume contains functional approaches to the description of language and culture and language and cultural change The approaches taken by the authors range from cognitive approaches including Stratificational grammar to more socially oriented ones including Systemic Functional linguistics The volume is organized into two sections The first section Functional Approaches to the Structure of Language Theory and Practice starts with contributions developing a Stratificational model these are followed by contributions focusing on some related functional model of language and by articles describing some particular set of language phenomena In the second section Functional Approaches to the History of Language and Linguistics general studies of language change are addressed first a second group of contributions examines language change lexicon and culture and the last cluster of contributions treats the history of linguistics and culture

Native Languages of the Americas Thomas Sebeok, 2013-11-11 Thirteen of the chapters that comprise the contents of this first volume of Native Languages of the Americas were originally commissioned by the undersigned in his capacity as Editor of the fourteen volume series 1963 1976 Current Trends in Linguistics All appeared in 1973 under Part Three of the quadripartite Vol 10 subtitled Linguistics in North America Two additional chapters are being held over for the volume to follow shortly devoted to Central and South American languages and linguistics where they more appropriately belong A fourteenth chapter on the Historiography of native North American linguistics was written similarly by invitation for Vol 13 subtitled Historiography of Linguistics published in 1975 Both Volumes 10 and 13 were jointly financed by the United States National Science Foundation and National Endowment for the Humanities with an enhancing contribution to the former by the Canada Council The generosity of these funding agencies was of course previously acknowledged in my respective Editor's Introductions to the two books mentioned but cannot be repeated too often without their welcome and timely assistance the global project could scarcely have been realized on so comprehensive a scale The Current Trends in Linguistics series was a long term venture of Mouton Publishers of The Hague under the imaginative in house direction of Peter de Ridder Various spin offs were foreseen and some of them happily realized

include word frequencies sounds and sound symbolism the structure of words taboo words lexical borrowing words in dictionaries and thesauri word origins and change place and personal names nicknames taxonomies word acquisition and bilingualism words in the mind word disorders and word games puns and puzzles Words are the most basic of all linguistic units the aspect of language of which everyone is likely to be most conscious A new word that makes it into the OED is prime news when baby says its first word its parents reckon it has started to speak knowing a language is often taken to mean knowing its words and languages are seen to be related by the similarities between their words Up to the twentieth century linguistic description was mainly an account of words and all the current subdivisions of linguistics have something to say about them A notable feature of human languages is the sheer vastness of their word inventories and scholars and writers have sometimes deliberately increased the richness of their languages by coining or importing new items into their word hoards The book presents scholarship and research in a manner that meets the interests of students and professionals and satisfies the curiosity of the educated reader
