Hardy, Jr., 2007-02-26 While moments come and go and popular trends are created only to be consumed and replaced a small handful of events are able to transcend place and time to become widely shared cultural touchstones Baseball with its longevity reverence for character and perseverance and symbolism of American values has produced a number of these modern myths people games and events that transcend society's love for the ephemeral to attain collective cultural significance The Babe's called shot and Ripken's 2 131st are more than significant moments in baseball They are culturally relevant events that contribute to an American mythology This book examines how certain baseball moments became mythic and why some moments are culturally persistent while others are limited in importance to the confines of sport After a discussion of baseball in myth and memory and the effect of the media on both chapters draw a distinction between the merely famous or infamous and the mythic act whether it's physical Bobby Thomson or symbolic Jackie Robinson matchups whether individual Alexander vs Lazzeri or team Red Sox Yankees 1978 playoff clubs both those that achieved 1927 Yankees and that choked 1964 Phillies and franchises including the winners Yankees and the losers Cubs      **Reading on the Middle Border** Christine Pawley, 2010-01-20 Reading is an everyday activity so taken for granted that it seems virtually invisible In spite of its ubiquity in modern life or perhaps because of its familiarity scholars have only recently begun paying attention to its development as a social practice During the nineteenth century an evolving print culture made reading an essential part of Americans daily routines To date the history of American reading practices has tended to focus on middle class white people living in northeastern cities before 1876 Reading on the Middle Border shifts the focus to the Midwest and broadens the base of

economic classes studied Christine Pawley investigates the use of print by ordinary Americans in the small rural community of Osage Iowa the town that shaped Hamlin Garland analyzing primary source material on education religious life a reading club and business affairs A major section of her study focuses on the public library an institution that provides a valuable window into the reading practices of men and women of various ages classes ethnicities and religions An extensive database of library circulation and accessions information combined with federal and state census data sheds light on the elusive issue of Who read what Pawley explores the ways print confirmed or challenged people s economic social and religious world and asks what values print expressed or confronted She also raises questions relating to modes and contexts of reading distinguishing between groups and individuals The picture of print in Osage is complex and defies reduction but by placing print in a community context and viewing printed materials as an expression of activities not mere artifacts Pawley enhances our understanding of the role of reading in American culture

Carr, Lucille M Schultz, 2005-02-21 Both a historical recovery and a critical rethinking of the functions and practices of textbooks *Archives of Instruction* Nineteenth Century Rhetorics Readers and Composition Books in the United States argues for an alternative understanding of our rhetorical traditions The authors describe how the pervasive influence of nineteenth century literacy textbooks demonstrate the early emergence of substantive instruction in reading and writing Tracing the histories of widespread educational practices the authors treat the textbooks as an important means of cultural formation that restores a sense of their distinguished and unique contributions At the beginning of the nineteenth century few people in the United States had access to significant school education or to the materials of instruction By century s end education was a mass though not universal experience and literacy textbooks were ubiquitous artifacts used both in home and in school by a growing number of learners from diverse backgrounds Many of the books have been forgotten their contributions slighted or dismissed or they are remembered through a haze of nostalgia as tokens of an idyllic form of schooling *Archives of Instruction* suggests strategies for re reading the texts and details the watersheds in the genre providing a new perspective on the material conditions of schooling book publication and emerging practices of literacy instruction The volume includes a substantial bibliography of primary and secondary works related to literacy instruction at all levels of education in the United States during the nineteenth century
