Trenton and Princeton 1777 Charleston 1780 to Cowpens and Guilford Court House 1781 Invasion of Canada 1812 to Battles of Lake Erie and the Thames 1813 First Bull Run 1861 to Antietam 1862 Pearl Harbor 1941 to Midway 1942 Luzon 1942 to Buna Gona 1943 Schweinfurt 1943 to the Big B 1944 Chongchon River 1950 to Operation Ripper 1951 In brisk narratives Ellman describes each battle explaining how it was fought and lost and then shifts gears to detail how leaders military as well as civilian such as George Washington Abraham Lincoln Chester Nimitz Douglas MacArthur James Doolittle and Matthew Ridgway assessed the factors that led to defeat and made changes to training tactics and strategy so that American forces entered the next battle wiser and able to win Ellman then uses this framework to evaluate the wars waged in more recent decades in Vietnam Afghanistan and Iraq Surprisingly despite the accepted consensus that these conflicts resulted in painful defeats the American military repeatedly showed its historic ability to react and recover and if not achieve victory at least stabilize the situation on the battlefield While US forces eventually pulled out of these three conflicts the overarching Cold War and War on Terror were still concluded in America s favor As this book makes clear the history of the United States at war is to a surprising degree the story of tenacity in the wake of defeat of flexibility and adaptability on the path to victory This is essential reading for understanding how battles are lost and won

*Our Flag Was Still There* Tom McMillan, 2023-06-06 *Our Flag Was Still There* details the improbable two hundred year journey of the original Star Spangled Banner from Fort McHenry in 1814 when Francis Scott Key first saw it to the Smithsonian in 2023 and the enduring family who defended, kept hidden, and ultimately donated the most famous flag in American history. Francis Scott Key saw the original Star Spangled Banner flying over Baltimore's Fort McHenry on September 14, 1814, following a twenty-five hour bombardment by the British Navy, inspiring him to write the words to our national anthem. Torn and tattered over the years, reduced in size to appease souvenir hunters, stuffed away in a New York City vault for the last two decades of the nineteenth century, the flag's mere existence after two hundred years is an improbable story of dedication, perseverance, patriotism, angst, inner family squabbles, and yes, more than a little luck. For this unlikely feat, we have the Armistead family to thank, led by Lieutenant Colonel George Armistead, commander of Fort McHenry, who took it home after the battle in clear defiance of U.S. Army regulations. It is only because of that quiet indiscretion that the flag survives to this day. Armistead's descendants kept and protected their family heirloom for ninety years. The flag's first photo was not taken until 1873, almost sixty years after Key saw it waving, and most Americans did not even know of its existence until Armistead's grandson loaned it to the Smithsonian in 1907. Tom McMillan tells a story as no one has before, digging deep into the archives of Fort McHenry and the Smithsonian, accessing never before published letters and documents, and presenting rare photos from the private collections of Armistead descendants and other sources. McMillan follows the flag on an often perilous journey through three centuries. *Our Flag Was Still There* provides new insight into an intriguing period of U.S. history, offering a story behind the story, account of one of the country's most treasured relics.

mass society pluralism and elitism in accounting for an aberrant event in American history the Spanish American War President McKinley and the Coming of the War 1898 volume 1 of this definitive history considered the origins of that war This second volume is concerned with the war's outcome the settlement in which the U S gained an empire The book begins by reviewing various expansionist episodes in U S history some successes some failures and by analyzing the complexities support and opposition involved in expansionism It then examines the work of expansionist writers men said to have driven the 1898-99 movement finding these claims to be questionable Hamilton assesses McKinley's decision making in regard to the settlement of the Spanish American War including the influences that might have moved him as well as his own justifications He then reviews the subsequent achievements the size and character of the new American empire trade flows the Philippine experience and U S efforts in China supposedly the prime goal of the new imperialism Many contemporary writers anticipated great possibilities in China but that fabled market remained minuscule throughout the following century Much American trade continued to be with Western Europe while the biggest change in U S exports went largely unnoticed Canada became the nation's number one trading partner In much historical writing McKinley is portrayed as little more than a front man for Mark Hanna the adept businessman politician who organized and led his presidential campaign aided by generous financial contributions from business leaders across the nation Hanna certainly was a leading figure in McKinley's career but the assumption that his influence was controlling is not justified as has been shown in recent research McKinley was far more than a figurehead easily manipulated by representatives of the interests
