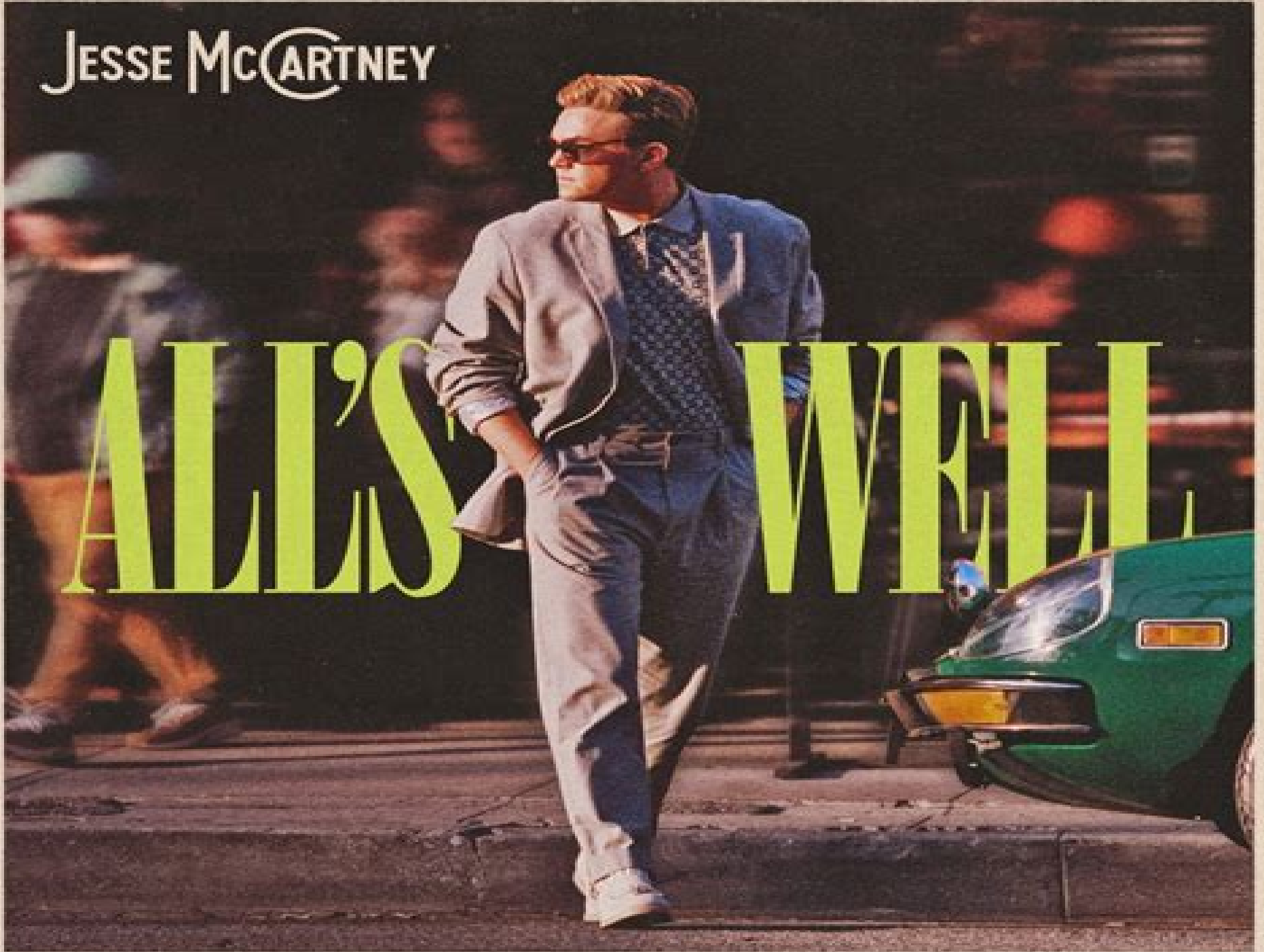

All's Well that Ends Well William Shakespeare, 2004-01-19 The New Cambridge Shakespeare appeals to students worldwide for its up to date scholarship and emphasis on performance The series features line by line commentaries and textual notes on the plays and poems Introductions are regularly refreshed with accounts of new critical stage and screen interpretations For the second edition of All's Well That Ends Well Alexander Leggatt has written a completely new introduction to Russell Fraser's text of one of Shakespeare's most puzzling ambiguous and demanding plays Leggatt's interest in performance is evident throughout the introduction particularly in his discussion of the instability of the main characters He also provides a full illustrated and thoughtful account of the play's critical and theatrical fortunes to the end of the twentieth century and explores our experience as an audience of seeing and hearing the play performed An updated reading list completes the volume

*The Yoke of Love* Avraham Oz, 1995 The theme of this book is disinheriting a father Appropriating Shylock's Jewishness into the broader field of Otherness and using *The Merchant of Venice* as a point of departure and a pivot of its discourse *The Yoke of Love* is an intellectual foray into many issues and areas of thought suggested by the Shakespearean text from cultural history and folklore to medieval philosophy and theology from politics of the theatre to literary theory from Jewish history to early modern debates on property usury and slavery all converging in the cultural and theatrical deployment of prophetic riddles in the play involving inspired caskets intriguing legal bonds and problematic tokens of love Tracing the conceptual history of prophecy since ancient times and relating it to relevant concepts such as conscience wisdom and time *The Yoke of Love* establishes the special standing of the prophetic in early modern discourse and English Renaissance drama

**Service and Dependency in Shakespeare's Plays** Judith Weil, 2005-06-09 This is an unusual study of the nature of service and other types of dependency and patronage in Shakespeare's drama By considering the close associations of service with childhood or youth marriage and friendship Judith Weil sheds light on social practice and dramatic action Approached as dynamic explorations of a familiar custom the plays are shown to demonstrate a surprising consciousness of obligations and a fascination with how dependants actively change each other They help us understand why early modern people may have found service both frightening and enabling Attentive to a range of historical sources and social and cultural issues Weil also emphasises the linguistic ambiguities created by service relationships and their rich potential for interpretation on the stage The book includes close readings of dramatic sequences in twelve plays including *Hamlet* *Macbeth* *The Taming of the Shrew* and *King Lear*
