Lawless, 2013-03-07 The statistics are alarming Some say that once every nine minutes a woman in the United States is beaten by her spouse or partner Others claim that once every four minutes a woman in the world is beaten by her spouse or partner More women go to emergency rooms in the United States for injuries sustained at the hands of their spouses and partners than for all other injuries combined Shelters for battered women are filled beyond capacity every single day of the year Despite the overwhelming evidence that violence in our homes is a daily reality most of us are not willing to acknowledge this private violence or talk about it openly *Women Escaping Violence* brings women s stories to the attention of the academy as well as the reading public While we may be unwilling or unable to talk about the issue of battered women many of us are ready to read what women have to say about their endangered lives Considerable scholarship is emerging in the area of domestic violence including many self help books about how to identify and escape abuse *Women Escaping Violence* offers the unique view of battered women s stories told in their own words as well as a feminist analysis of how these women use the power of narrative to transform their sense of self and regain a place within the larger society Lawless shares with the reader the heart wrenching experiences of battered women who have escaped violence by fleeing to shelters with little more than a few items hastily shoved into a plastic bag and often with small children in tow The book includes women s stories as they are told and retold within the shelter in the presence of other battered women and of caregivers It analyzes the uses made of these narratives by those seeking to counsel battered women as well as by the women themselves

*Violence and the Female Imagination* Paula Ruth Gilbert, 2006-03-31 In the past twenty years Quebec women writers including Aline Chamberland Claire D Suzanne Jacob and H l ne Rioux have created female characters who are fascinated with bold sexual actions and language cruelty and violence at times culminating in infanticide and serial killing Paula Ruth Gilbert argues that these Quebec feminist writers are re framing gender *Violence and the Female Imagination* explores whether these imagined women are striking out at an external other or harming themselves through acts of self destruction and depression Gilbert examines the degree to which women are imitating men in the outward direction of their anger and hostility and suggests that such tough women may be mocking men in their macho exploits of sexuality and violence She illustrates the ways in which Quebec female authors are feminizing violence or re envisioning gender in North American culture Gilbert bridges methodological gaps and integrates history sociology literary theory feminist theory and other disciplinary approaches to provide a framework for the discussion of important ethical and aesthetic questions

**The Woman in the Red Dress** Minrose Gwin, 2002 Graceful and impassioned *The Woman in the Red Dress* offers important new approaches to narratives about father daughter incest as well as stories that contaminate the myth of home as a safe space and map a geography of sexual violence victimization and

survival Gwin situates her analysis of fiction such as Morrison's *The Bluest Eye*, Alice Walker's *The Color Purple*, Dorothy Allison's *Bastard out of Carolina* and Jane Smiley's *A Thousand Acres* within contemporary debates concerning survivor discourse, theories of domestic space and issues of race and class. She also explores books such as Hulme's *The Bone People* that enter a murky and liminal queer space in which gender itself travels and the most claustrophobic physical and social spaces can unexpectedly unhinge and open.

What made Emily Dickinson the reclusive woman she was and the dynamic poet she became? *A Wounded Deer* concludes that her enigmatic poetry may have originated from a personal exposure to incest and examines how she used her craft to make the transition from victim to survivor at a time when the medical profession failed to acknowledge any damage related to this event. Research into the Dickinson family background, evidence from letters and poems and the testimony of people who knew the poet indicate that she apparently displayed at least 33 of 37 Incest Survivors Aftereffects from a diagnostic tool used internationally by many therapists when a client exhibits over 25 of these behavior patterns, sexual abuse is strongly suspected. The second section of the book deals with the three stages of recovery from complex post-traumatic stress as outlined by trauma expert Judith Herman. Remarkably, Dickinson seems to have completed stages one and two but was unable to complete stage three because she could not reconnect with the outside world. Writing was Dickinson's way of identifying the nature of her trauma, coming to terms with its impact, breaking the silence to inspire future women writers and reconstructing a new persona, albeit from the sanctuary of her self-imposed isolation. The final section of *A Wounded Deer* examines what the poet might have discovered about sexual abuse from the literature she read and how she responded to this information in her own work. It discusses *The Bible*, Shakespeare, Byron, Hawthorne, Charlotte Brontë, George Eliot and Barrett Browning. *A Wounded Deer* is fascinating, clearly written, difficult to put down and a must for Dickinson scholars, psychologists and anyone interested in psychological interpretations of literature.

Iranian Women in the Memoir Emira Derbel, 2017-05-11 This book investigates the various reasons behind the elevation of the memoir previously categorized as a marginalized form of life writing that denudes the private space of women especially in Western Asian countries such as Iran Through a comparative investigation of Azar Nafisi's *Reading Lolita in Tehran* and Marjane Satrapi's *Persepolis 1* and *2* the book examines the way both narrative and graphic memoirs offer possibilities for Iranian women to reclaim new territory transgress a post traumatic revolution and reconstruct a new model of womanhood that evades socio political and religious restrictions Exile is conceptualized as empowering rather than a continued status of loss and disillusionment and the liminality of both women writers turns into a space of artistic production The book also resists the New Orientalist scope within which *Reading Lolita in Tehran* more than *Persepolis* has been misread In order to reject these allegations this work sheds light on the representation of Iranian women in *Reading Lolita in Tehran* not as weak victims held captive by a totalitarian version of Islam but as active participants rewriting their stories through the liberating power of the memoir The comparative approach between narrative and comic memoirs is a fruitful way of displaying similar experiences of disillusionment loss return and exile through different techniques The common thread uniting both memoirs is their zeal to reclaim Iranian women's agency and strength over subservience and passivity
