Wilmer, H. van Maanen, 2024-04-02 *Theatre Worlds in Motion* aims to clarify the different theatre traditions and practices in Western Europe from a historical and sociological perspective The book grew out of a perceived need among theatre scholars who had recognised that while they understood the theatre system of their own country they often found it difficult to discover how it compared with other countries The chapters analyse the basic components and dynamics of theatre systems in seventeen Western European nations in order to elucidate how the systems function in general and how they vary in different cultures The book provides a sense of what has been happening recently in particular countries and indicates how the theatre systems

have developed over time and have led to the current practices and structures Each national chapter considers the historical tradition and place of theatre within the country and analyses the role of the state in fostering theatre during the last fifty years Material from the national chapters has been used in two general chapters at the beginning and end of the book to provide an overview to developments in all Western Europe The introductory chapter on decentralisation discusses the tendency amongst governments to encourage cultural development outside the national capital by providing subsidy for regional theatre venues and theatre companies and in many cases by developing the decision making and budgetary powers for the theatre to regional and local authorities The epilogue on the functioning of theatre examines the common structures of theatre in society as described in the seventeen national chapters and it proposes areas for future research **The**

**Fantasies of Empire** Joseph Donohue, 2005-09. In the London summer of 1894, members of the National Vigilance Society, led by the well-known social reformer Laura Ormiston Chant, confronted the Empire Theatre of Varieties, Leicester Square, and its brilliant manager George Edwardes as he applied for a routine license renewal. On grounds that the Empire's promenade was the nightly resort of prostitutes, that the costumes in the theatre's ballets were grossly indecent, and that the moral health of the nation was imperiled, Chant demanded that the London County Council either deny the theatre its license or require radical changes in the Empire's entertainment and clientele before granting renewal. The resulting license restriction and the tremendous public controversy that ensued raised important issues, social, cultural, intellectual and moral, still pertinent today. *Fantasies of Empire* is the first book to recount in full the story of the Empire licensing controversy in all its captivating detail. Contemporaneous accounts are interwoven with Donohue's identification and analysis of the larger issues raised. What the controversy reveals about contemporary sexual and social relations, what light it sheds on opposing views regarding the place of art and entertainment in modern society, and what it says about the pervasive effect of British imperialism on society's behavior in the later years of Queen Victoria's reign.

Donohue connects the controversy to one of the most interesting developments in the history of modern theatre the simultaneous emergence of a more sophisticated varied and moneyed audience and a municipal government insistent on its right to control and regulate that audience s social and cultural character and even its moral behavior Rich in illustrations and entertainingly written Fantasies of Empire will appeal to theatre dance and social historians and to students of popular entertainment the Victorian period urban studies gender studies leisure studies and the social history of architecture
