Jacobs, 1993 Written by first rate scholars these 10 essays give focus to the antislavery movement in Boston particularly to the significance of African American abolitionists Choice handsome lavishly illustrated and informative The New England Quarterly this work is a thoughtful long overdue discourse on individual and group accomplishments It is replete with absorbing illustrations which when accompanied by insightful essays depict the courage of those who labored for equality in antebellum Boston Journal of the Early Republic Until recently little was known of the contributions of African Americans in the antebellum abolition movement Massachusetts having granted voting rights early on to black males was a center of antislavery agitation *Courage and Conscience* documents the black activism in 19th century Boston that was critical to the success of the abolitionist cause     The City-State of Boston Mark Peterson, 2019-04-23 A groundbreaking history of early America that shows how Boston built and sustained an independent city state in New England before being folded into the United States In the vaunted annals of America s founding Boston has long been held up as an exemplary city upon a hill and the cradle of liberty for an independent United States Wrestling this iconic urban center from these misleading tired clich s The City State of Boston highlights Boston s overlooked past as an autonomous city state and in doing so offers a pathbreaking and brilliant new history of early America Following Boston s development over three centuries Mark Peterson discusses how this self governing Atlantic trading center began as a refuge from Britain s Stuart monarchs and how through its bargain with the slave trade and ratification of the Constitution it would tragically lose integrity and autonomy as it became incorporated into the greater United States Drawing from vast archives and featuring unfamiliar figures alongside well known ones such as John Winthrop Cotton Mather and John Adams Peterson explores Boston s origins in sixteenth century utopian ideals its founding and expansion into the hinterland of New England and the growth of its distinctive political economy with ties to the West Indies and southern Europe By the 1700s Boston was at full strength with wide Atlantic trading circuits and cultural ties both within and beyond Britain s empire After the cataclysmic Revolutionary War Bostoners aimed to negotiate a relationship with the American confederation but through the next century the new United States unraveled Boston s regional reign The fateful decision to ratify the Constitution undercut its power as Southern planters and slave owners dominated national politics and corroded the city state s vision of a common good for all Peeling away the layers of myth surrounding a revered city The City State of Boston offers a startlingly fresh understanding of America s history     **The Abolitionists and the South, 1831-1861** Stanley Harrold, 2021-11-21 Within the American antislavery movement abolitionists were distinct from others in the movement in advocating on the basis of moral principle the immediate emancipation of slaves and equal rights for black people Instead of focusing on the immediatists as products of northern culture as many previous historians have done Stanley Harrold examines their involvement with antislavery action in the South particularly in the region that bordered the free states How he asks did

antislavery action in the South help shape abolitionist beliefs and policies in the period leading up to the Civil War Harrold explores the interaction of northern abolitionist southern white emancipators and southern black liberators in fostering a continuing antislavery focus on the South and integrates southern antislavery action into an understanding of abolitionist reform culture He discusses the impact of abolitionist missionaries who preached an antislavery gospel to the enslaved as well as to the free Harrold also offers an assessment of the impact of such activities on the coming of the Civil War and Reconstruction

In Hope of Liberty James O. Horton, Lois E. Horton, 1998-04-30 Prince Hall a black veteran of the American Revolution was insulted and disappointed but probably not surprised when white officials refused his offer of help He had volunteered a troop of 700 Boston area blacks to help quell a rebellion of western Massachusetts farmers led by Daniel Shays during the economic turmoil in the uncertain period following independence Many African Americans had fought for America's liberty and their own in the Revolution but their place in the new nation was unresolved As slavery was abolished in the North free blacks gained greater opportunities but still faced a long struggle against limits to their freedom against discrimination and against southern slavery The lives of these men and women are vividly described in In Hope of Liberty spanning the 200 years and eight generations from the colonial slave trade to the Civil War In this marvelously peopled history James and Lois Horton introduce us to a rich cast of characters There are familiar historical figures such as Crispus Attucks a leader of the Boston Massacre and one of the first casualties of the American Revolution Sojourner Truth former slave and eloquent antislavery and women's rights activist whose own family had been broken by slavery when her son became a wedding present for her owner's daughter and Prince Whipple George Washington's aide easily recognizable in the portrait of Washington crossing the Delaware River And there are the countless men and women who struggled to lead their daily lives with courage and dignity Zilpha Elaw a visionary revivalist who preached before crowds of thousands David James Peck the first black to graduate from an American medical school in 1848 Paul Cuffe a successful seafaring merchant who became an ardent supporter of the black African colonization movement and Nancy Prince at eighteen the effective head of a scattered household of four siblings each boarded in different homes who at twenty five was formally presented to the Russian court In a seamless narrative weaving together all these stories and more the Hortons describe the complex networks both formal and informal that made up free black society from the black churches which provided a sense of community and served as a training ground for black leaders and political action to the countless newspapers which spoke eloquently of their aspirations for blacks and played an active role in the antislavery movement to the informal networks which allowed far flung families to maintain contact and which provided support and aid to needy members of the free black community and to fugitives from the South Finally they describe the vital role of the black family the cornerstone of this variegated and tightly knit community In Hope of Liberty brilliantly illuminates the free black communities of the antebellum North as they struggled to reconcile conflicting cultural identities and to work for social change in an atmosphere of racial

injustice As the black community today still struggles with many of the same problems this insightful history reminds us how far we have come and how far we have yet to go *Master Slave Husband Wife* Ilyon Woo,2024-01-16 Presents the remarkable true story of Ellen and William Craft who escaped slavery through daring determination and disguise with Ellen passing as a wealthy disabled white man and William posing as his slave Diary of a Christian Soldier Rufus Kinsley,David C. McNamara, 2004 During the formative years of the American republic lawyers and architects both eager to secure public affirmation of their professional status worked together to create specialized purpose built courthouses to replace the informal judicial settings in which trials took place during the colonial era In *From Tavern to Courthouse* Martha J. McNamara addresses this fundamental redefinition of civic space in Massachusetts Professional collaboration she argues benefitted both lawyers and architects as it reinforced their desire to be perceived as trained specialists solely concerned with promoting the public good These courthouses now reserved exclusively for legal proceedings and occupying specialized locations in the town plans represented a new vision for the design organization and function of civic space McNamara shows how courthouse spaces were refined to reflect the increasingly professionalized judicial system and particularly to accommodate the rapidly growing participation of lawyers in legal proceedings In following this evolution of judicial space from taverns and town houses to monumental courthouse complexes she discusses the construction of Boston's first civic building the 1658 Town House and its significance for colonial law and commerce the rise of professionally trained lawyers through the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries and changes in judicial rituals at the turn of the century and development of specialized judicial landscapes A case study of three courthouses built in Essex County between 1785 and 1805 delineates these changes as they unfold in one county over a thirty year period Concise and clearly written *From Tavern to Courthouse* reveals the processes by which architects and lawyers crafted new judicial spaces to provide a specialized exclusive venue in which lawyers could articulate their professional status
