Art & Political Expression in Early China Martin Joseph Powers,1991-01-01 In This path breaking book Martin J Powers examines the art and politics of Han dynasty 206 B C A D 220 and show that both were shaped by the rise of an educated non aristocratic public the Confucian literati that questioned the authority of the rich and royal at all levels By considering the design and construction of local tombs and shrines their mural schemes subject matter and style the author distinguishes three major traditions of taste and places each tradition within a narrative of political rivalries in northeast China **Art, Religion, and Politics in Medieval China** Qiang Ning,2004-03-31 The cave temple complex popularly known as the Dunhuang caves is the world s largest extant repository of Tang Buddhist art Among the best preserved of the Dunhuang caves is the Zhai Family Cave built in 642 It is this remarkable cave temple that forms the focus of Ning Qiang s cross disciplinary exploration of the interrelationship of art religion and politics during the Tang The author combines in his careful examination of the paintings and sculptures found there the historical study of pictures with the pictorial study of history By employing this two fold approach he is able to refer to textual evidence in interpreting the formal features of the cave temple paintings and to employ visual details to fill in the historical gaps inevitably left by text oriented scholars The result is a comprehensive analysis of the visual culture of the period and a vivid description of social life in medieval China The original Zhai Family Cave pictures were painted over in the tenth century and remained hidden until the early 1940s Once exposed the early artwork appeared fresh and colorful in comparison with other Tang paintings at Dunhuang The relatively fine condition of the Zhai Family Cave is crucial to our understanding of the original pictorial program found there and offers a unique opportunity to investigate the visual details of the original paintings and sculptures in the cave At the same time the remaining traces of reconstruction and redecoration provide a new perspective on how for over three centuries a wealthy Chinese clan used its familial cave as a political showcase **A Companion to Chinese Art** Martin J. **The Animal and the Daemon in Early China** Roel Sterckx, 2012-02-01 Exploring the cultural perception of animals in early Chinese thought this careful reading of Warring States and Han dynasty writings analyzes how views of animals were linked to human self perception and investigates the role of the animal world in the conception of ideals of sagehood and socio political authority Roel Sterckx shows how perceptions of the animal world influenced early Chinese views of man s place among the living species and in the world at large He argues that the classic Chinese perception of the world did not insist on clear categorical or ontological boundaries between animals humans and other creatures such as ghosts and spirits Instead the animal realm was positioned as part of an organic whole and the mutual relationships among the living species both as natural and cultural creatures were characterized as contingent continuous and interdependent

**Ban Gu's History of Early China , Pattern and Person** Martin J. Powers, 2020-03-17 In Classical China crafted artifacts offered a material substrate for abstract thought as graphic paradigms for social relationships Focusing on the fifth to second centuries B C Martin Powers explores how these paradigms continued to inform social thought long after the material substrate had been abandoned In this detailed study the author makes the claim that artifacts are never neutral as a distinctive possession each object through the abstracting function of style offers a material template for scales of value Likewise through style pictorial forms can make claims about material referents the things depicted By manipulating these scales and their referents artifacts can shape the way status social role or identity is understood and enforced The result is a kind of spatial epistemology within which the identities of persons are

constructed Powers thereby posits a relationship between art and society that operates at a level deeper than iconography attributes or social institutions Historically Pattern and Person traces the evolution of personhood in China from a condition of hereditary status to one of achieved social role and greater personal choice This latter development essential for bureaucratic organization and individual achievement challenges the conventional opposition between Western individuals and collective Asians

**Chinese Cosmopolitanism** Shuchen Xiang,2023-09-26 A provocative defense of a forgotten Chinese approach to identity and difference Historically the Western encounter with difference has been catastrophic the extermination and displacement of aboriginal populations the transatlantic slave trade and colonialism China however took a different historical path In Chinese Cosmopolitanism Shuchen Xiang argues that the Chinese cultural tradition was from its formative beginnings and throughout its imperial history a cosmopolitan melting pot that synthesized the different cultures that came into its orbit Unlike the West which cast its collisions with different cultures in Manichean terms of the ontologically irreconcilable difference between civilization and barbarism China was a dynamic identity created out of difference The reasons for this Xiang argues are philosophical Chinese philosophy has the conceptual resources for providing alternative ways to understand pluralism Xiang explains that Chinese identity is not what the West understands as a racial identity it is not a group of people related by common descent or heredity but rather a hybrid of coalescing cultures To use the Western discourse of race to frame the Chinese view of non Chinese she argues is a category error Xiang shows that China was both internally cosmopolitan embracing distinct peoples into a common identity and externally cosmopolitan having knowledge of faraway lands without an ideological need to subjugate them Contrasting the Chinese understanding of efficacy described as harmony with the Western understanding of order she argues that the Chinese sought to gain influence over others by having them spontaneously accept the virtue of one's position These ideas from Chinese philosophy she contends offer a new way to understand today's multipolar world and can make a valuable contribution to contemporary discussions in the critical philosophy of race

**Picturing Technology in China** Peter J. Golas,2014-12-01 Although the history of technological and scientific illustrations is a well established field in the West scholarship on the much longer Chinese experience is still undeveloped This work by Peter Golas is a short illustrated overview tracing the subject to pre Han inscriptions but focusing mainly on the Song Yuan Ming and Qing dynasties His main theme is that technological drawings developed in a different way in China from in the West largely because they were made by artists rather than by specialist illustrators or practitioners of technology He examines the techniques of these artists their use of painting woodblock prints and the book and what their drawings reveal about changing technology in agriculture industry



architecture astronomical military and other spheres The text is elegantly written and the images about 100 in all are carefully chosen This is likely to appeal to both scholars and general readers      Public Memory in Early China K. E. Brashier, 2020-10-26 In early imperial China the dead were remembered by stereotyping them by relating them to the existing public memory and not by vaunting what made each person individually distinct and extraordinary in his or her lifetime Their posthumous names were chosen from a limited predetermined pool their descriptors were derived from set phrases in the classical tradition and their identities were explicitly categorized as being like this cultural hero or that sage official in antiquity In other words postmortem remembrance was a process of pouring new ancestors into prefabricated molds or stamping them with rigid cookie cutters Public Memory in Early China is an examination of this pouring and stamping process After surveying ways in which learning in the early imperial period relied upon memorization and recitation K E Brashier treats three definitive parameters of identity name age and kinship as ways of negotiating a person's relative position within the collective consciousness He then examines both the tangible and intangible media responsible for keeping that defined identity welded into the infrastructure of Han public memory
