The seashore has long been the subject of fascination and study the Ancient Greek scholar Aristotle made observations and wrote about Mediterranean sea urchins The considerable knowledge of what to eat and where it could be found has been passed down since prehistoric times by oral tradition in many societies in Britain it is still unwise to eat shellfish in months without an r in them Over the last three hundred years or so we have seen the formalization of science and this of course has touched intertidal ecology Linnaeus classified specimens collected from the seashore and many common species *Patella vulgata* L *Mytilus edulis* L *Littorina littorea* L bear his imprint because he formally described named and catalogued them Early natural historians described zonation patterns in the first part of the 19th century Audouin and Milne Edwards 1832 and the Victorians became avid admirers and collectors of shore animals and plants with the advent of the new fashion of seaside holidays Gosse 1856 Kingsley 1856 As science became professionalized towards the end of the century marine biologists took advantage of low tides to gain easy access to marine life for taxonomic work and classical studies of functional morphology The first serious studies of the ecology of the shore were made at this time e g *Rocky Shores: Exploitation in Chile and South Africa* W. Roy Siegfried,2013-03-07 It seems almost trite to introduce this book by saying that man has been exploiting the intertidal zone for food for a long time Just how long nobody knows for sure but the prehistoric inhabitants of Terra Amata on the Mediterranean coast near Nice ate marine intertidal animals at least 300 000 years ago Similar impressive evidence going back to at least 100000 years exists for prehistoric man s consumption of intertidal animals along the South African coast However early man s dependence on intertidal resources probably goes back much further in time During the last 2 million or so years temperate Eurasia experienced some 20 glaciations interspersed by warm equable periods Different

modes of life were open to man in colonizing the northern temperate zone One was to become a big game hunter specializing for example on mammoths the other to exploit marine intertidal resources Of the two probably the shoreline offered an easier environment for an original scavenging food gatherer

Brown, 2016-09-06 Aquatic ecosystems are currently experiencing unprecedented levels of impact from human activities including over exploitation of resources habitat destruction pollution and the influence of climate change The impacts of these activities on the microbial ecology of aquatic environments are only now beginning to be defined One of the many implications of environmental degradation and climate change is the geographical expansion of disease causing microbes such as those from the *Vibrio* genus Elevating sea surface temperatures correlate with increasing *Vibrio* numbers and disease in marine animals e g corals and humans Contamination of aquatic environments with heavy metals and other pollutants affects microbial ecology with downstream effects on biogeochemical cycles and nutrient turnover Also of importance is the pollution of aquatic environments with antibiotics resistance genes and the mobile genetic elements that house resistance genes from human and animal waste Such contaminated environments act as a source of resistance genes long after an antibiotic has ceased being used in the community Environments contaminated with mobile genetic elements that are adapted to human commensals and pathogens function to capture new resistance genes for potential reintroduction back into clinical environments This research topic encompasses these diverse topics and describes the effects of human activity on the microbial ecology and function in aquatic environments and describes methods of restoration and for modelling disturbances **Interactions in the Marine Benthos** Stephen J.
