**Always Astonished** Fernando Pessoa, 1888-1936 After looking for him in the poems we search for him in the prose The pursuit of the Other in Pessoa's work is never ending writes Edwin Honig Essential to understanding the great Portuguese poet are the essays written about and by his heteronyms Alberto Caeiro Ricardo Reis and Alvaro de Campos the several pseudonyms under which he wrote an extraordinary body of poetry In *Always Astonished* Pessoa and his several selves debate and discuss one another's work revealing how Portuguese modernism was shaped Fernando Pessoa is one of the great voices of twentieth century literature and these manifestos letters journal notes and critical essays range through aesthetics lyric poetry dramatic and visual arts and the psychology of the artist He gives us too a singularly heterodox political position in his strange work of fiction *The Anarchist Banker* By Kelman Out of Pessoa Doug Nufer, 2023 In 2002 Doug Nufer wrote a story narrated by a tout who proposed a novel way to beat the races It was so absurd and ludicrous it gave him an idea So Nufer went to Emerald Downs home of thoroughbred racing in the Northwest There he split himself into three characters modeled on the heteronyms of Fernando Pessoa Using a money management plan from a James Kelman short story Nufer gave these characters money and set them free to gamble He returned to the track every week for a full season and his characters heteronyms continued to bet with real money and in the name of art At the end of the season he had pages of data in the form of a wagering diary the outcome of a literary experiment that formed the basis of a literal experimental novel From Lisbon to the World George Monteiro, 2018-09-04 Fernando Pessoa is one of the greatest poets of the 20th century Until some years ago known in the English speaking world only among a minority of connoisseurs his work is finally becoming available in English translations and more are in the process of reaching the literary public Born in Lisbon in 1888 Pessoa was only forty seven when he died but he left behind a staggering number of unpublished manuscripts that are still being screened and brought to light George Steiner heralded the day Pessoa discovered his major Portuguese heteronyms for no country had ever seen the birth of four great poets in a single day That was a reference to the personae Pessoa created the famous heteronyms Alberto Caeiro Alvaro de Campos and Ricardo Reis besides the man himself all poets in their own right with their biographies and even critical exchanges among themselves Today well over a hundred Pessoa heteronyms are known including notably the semi heteronym Bernardo Soares author of *The Book of Disquiet* presently available in two English translations Lately another Pessoa is emerging an English writer as well as a thinker Indeed having been educated in Durban South Africa where his stepfather was the consul of Portugal the poet had a strong English education that shaped his life and thought George Monteiro has been in the forefront of the uncovering of this side of Pessoa Author among many other works of *The Presence of Pessoa* English American and Southern African Literary Responses and *Fernando Pessoa and Nineteenth Century Anglo American Literature* in this volume Monteiro continues to explore and interpret the world of Pessoa to English speaking readers *The Presence of Pessoa* George Monteiro, 2021-12-14 Fernando

*Global Impact of the Portuguese Language* Asela de Laguna, 2018-01-16 Within the cultural and literary context of contemporary Portugal and Western literature, 1998 was unquestionably the year that Portuguese writing gained international recognition as JosU Saramago became the first Portuguese writer ever to receive the Nobel Prize in literature. The concluding part of this volume offers a short, comprehensive listing of anthologies, general studies, and the most popular translations of the best of Portuguese writing from Portugal and Africa. This lively volume constitutes a first, pioneering effort to contribute to a deepening appreciation and understanding of Portuguese writing. Anyone interested in ethnic writing will find this book an invaluable education resource with which to begin an exploration of Portuguese writing in the United States.

**Resistance** Victor Serge, 1989-11 Victor Serge an authentic witness of the political and cultural struggles of this century wrote these poems of Resistance in Orenburg in Central Asia where he was sent into exile by Stalin in 1933 He eulogizes close friends and comrades and movingly records and shares the lives of the people he lived among on the steppe far from the centers of power intrigue and history Richard Greeman writes in his introduction that Serge spoke the truth aloud and perpetuated the spiritual tradition of the Russian revolutionary intelligentsia at the very moment when the voices of his colleagues were forced into silence so that this collection of poems written in deportation on the Ural represents a unique strand of continuity between a lost generation and what one hopes will be a new beginning with no blank pages in Soviet literature
