Poesía (1955-1972) Alejandra Pizarnik, 2001 Presentamos la obra poetica completa de una de las escritoras argentinas mas emblematicas de la segunda mitad de siglo la controvertida polemica y malograda Alejandra Pizarnik una leyenda de las letras hispanas figura de culto en vida un autentico mito *Árbol de Alejandra* Fiona Joy Mackintosh, Karl Posso, 2007 This volume reassesses Argentinian poet Alejandra Pizarnik 1936 72 in the light of recent publications to her complete poetry and prose and previously unavailable archive material *Exchanging Lives* Susan Bassnett, Alejandra Pizarnik, 2002 Exchanging Lives brings poet and translator into a transforming dialogue The act of translating the Argentinean poet Alejandra Pizarnik not only frees fixed and frozen signs to migrate into another language but brings about changes in Susan Bassnett's own writing The collection contains four sections The first is of translations from Pizarnik's *Árbol de Diana* 1962 that Octavio Paz wrote does not contain a single false detail and put Pizarnik among the finest Latin American writers The second juxtaposes translations of Pizarnik with poems by Susan Bassnett These share common concerns as women but it is a dialogue of difference as Bassnett fighting for personal writing space from the clamours of work and the mothering wings that hold back my writing hand enters the world of Pizarnik who described herself as a silent woman who sometimes flows with language whose work speaks always of social isolation and not belonging The third section *Asia of my imaginings* is a sequence of poems by Bassnett that could not have been written without the experience of translating Pizarnik's daring subversive work The fourth brief section condenses the recognitions of identity and difference Book jacket **Childhood in the Works of Silvina Ocampo and Alejandra Pizarnik** Fiona Joy Mackintosh, 2003 In the final analysis Ocampo's works achieve equilibrium between childhood and age whereas Pizarnik's much discussed poetic crisis of exile from language itself parallels her deep sense of anxiety at being exiled from the world of childhood BOOK JACKET *From the Forbidden Garden* Alejandra Pizarnik, Antonio Beneyto, 2003-12 This selection of thirty letters and two postcards written between September 2 1969 and September 12 1972 includes most of Pizarnik's correspondence with Spanish writer editor artist Antonio Beneyto From these informative letters we learn about her influences the artists poets and writers she preferred and her reactions to them She collaborated on various projects and cultivated many literary and personal ties with writers of the stature of Julio Cortazar Olga Orozco Octavio Paz Pieyre de Mandiargues Silvina Ocampo and Luisa Sofovich among others Although the corpus of Pizarnik's writing available in English has expanded in the last twelve years it is still far from adequate This is the first time that a selection of letters from Alejandra Pizarnik to Antonio Beneyto has been published in English The translators hope that this volume will serve English speaking audiences as a new bridge to her work BOOK JACKET **The Critical Poem** Thorpe Running, 1996 In this book scholar Thorpe Running shows that a skeptical approach to both language and poetry places eight poets from three countries in Latin America within a strain of poetry prefigured by Stephane Mallarme Octavio Paz Jorge Luis Borges Roberto Juarroz Alejandra Pizarnik Alberto Girri Juan Luis Martinez Gonzalo Millan and David

Huerta span three different generations In addition to their age and geographical differences their poetry bears no obvious similarities All eight however are poetas pensantes or thinking poets and underlying the work of these probing writers is the disturbing question Does language do what it is supposed to do The answer is negative for all these poets who see their poems as being made up of words that don t work

Entiendes is literally translated as Do you understand Do you get it But those who do get it will also hear within this question a subtler meaning Are you queer Are you one of us The issues of gay and lesbian identity represented by this question are explored for the first time in the context of Spanish and Hispanic literature in this groundbreaking anthology Combining intimate knowledge of Spanish speaking cultures with contemporary queer theory these essays address texts that share both a common language and a concern with lesbian gay and bisexual identities Using a variety of approaches the contributors tease the homoerotic messages out of a wide range of works from chronicles of colonization in the Caribbean to recent Puerto Rican writing from the work of Cervantes to that of the most outrageous contemporary Latina performance artists This volume offers a methodology for examining work by authors and artists whose sexuality is not so much open as an open secret respecting for example the biographical privacy of writers like Gabriela Mistral while responding to the voices that speak in their writing

Contributing to an archeology of queer discourses Entiendes also includes important studies of terminology and encoded homosexuality in Argentine literature and Caribbean journalism of the late nineteenth century Whether considering homosexual panic in the stories of Borges performances by Latino AIDS activists in Los Angeles queer lives in turn of the century Havana and Buenos Aires or the mapping of homosexual geographies of 1930s New York in Lorca s Ode to Walt Whitman Entiendes is certain to stir interest at the crossroads of sexual and national identities while proving to be an invaluable resource

Jewish writing has only recently begun to be recognized as a major cultural phenomenon in Latin American literature Nevertheless the majority of students and even Latin American literary specialists remain uninformed about this significant body of writing This Dictionary is the first comprehensive bibliographical and critical source book on Latin American Jewish literature It represents the research efforts of 50 scholars from the United States Latin America and Israel who are dedicated to the advancement of Latin American Jewish studies An introduction by the editor is followed by entries on 118 authors that provide both biographical information and a critical summary of works Argentina Brazil and Mexico home to the largest Jewish communities in Latin America are the countries with the greatest representation but there are essays on writers from Venezuela Chile Uruguay Peru Colombia Costa Rica and Cuba

Translating and Reimagining - Recovering Pizarnik in her late Prose Works Juliana Nalerio, 2012-06-25 Bachelor Thesis from the year 2011 in the subject Literature Latin America grade Pass course Poetry and Prose Poems of Alejandra Pizarnik language English abstract This senior thesis examines the authorial image of Argentine Jewish poet Alejandra Pizarnik 1936-1972. Long thought of as a modern poet with minimal connection to any one tradition, I re-imagine her as a poet of Judaism, language and childhood through close readings of works many poems en prosa written late in her life and after her father's death. This thesis has three chapters: 1. Images of the Artist, 2. New Readings of Pizarnik's Prose Poems, and 3. Translating Pizarnik's Prose Poems. In the first chapter I examine notions of Pizarnik created by critics and by the public, then move to re-imagining her as a poet in a new lens. In chapter 2, close readings of prose poems substantiate those claims made in my re-imagining. Finally, chapter 3 provides annotated translations of five poems, four previously untranslated: *Los muertos y la lluvia* (The Dead and the Rain), *Dificultades barrocas* (Baroque Difficulties), *Desconfianza* (Distrust), *Devoción* (Devotion), and the only poem in verse *Poema para el padre* (Poem for my Father). My interpretation of Pizarnik is influenced by concepts including Lacan's desire, Bachelard's poetics of internal space, Turner's liminality, and Borges' infidelity in translation, amongst others. Ultimately, I hope this reading of the complicated poet succeeds in recovering essential aspects of her *cuerpo poético* (poetic body of work).
