Framing disability as a minority discourse rather than a medical one, the book added depth to oppressive narratives and revealed novel liberatory ones. Through her incisive readings of such texts as Harriet Beecher Stowe's *Uncle Tom's Cabin* and Rebecca Harding Davis's *Life in the Iron Mills*, Rosemarie Garland Thomson exposed the social forces driving representations of disability.
