incorporated special colors materials and ornaments into their designs to imbue their baby carriers with sacred meaning Hide Wood and Willow reveals the wide variety of cradles used by thirty two Plains tribes including communities often ignored or overlooked such as the Wichita Lipan Apache Tonkawa and Plains M tis Each chapter offers information about the tribe s background preferred types of cradles birth customs and methods for distinguishing the sex of the baby through cradle ornamentation Despite decades of political and social upheaval among Plains tribes the significance of the cradle endures Today a baby can still be found wrapped up and wide eyed supported by a baby board With its blend of stunning full color images and detailed information this book is a fitting tribute to an important and ongoing tradition among indigenous cultures
