McCusker, 2008 A collective biography of the women who shaped early country and western music Bird Chuck Haddix, 2013-09-30 Saxophone virtuoso Charlie Bird Parker began playing professionally in his early teens became a heroin addict at 16 changed the course of music and then died when only 34 years old His friend Robert Reisner observed Parker in the brief span of his life crowded more living into it than any other human being Like Louis Armstrong Duke Ellington Miles Davis and John Coltrane he was a transitional composer and improviser who ushered in a new era of jazz by pioneering belop and influenced subsequent generations of musicians Meticulously researched and written Bird The Life and Music of Charlie Parker tells the story of his life music and career This new biography artfully weaves together firsthand accounts from those who knew him with new information about his life and career to create a compelling narrative portrait of a tragic genius While other books about Parker have focused primarily on his music and recordings this portrait reveals the troubled man behind the music illustrating how his addictions and struggles with mental health affected his life and career He was alternatively generous and miserly a loving husband and father at home but an incorrigible philanderer on the road and a chronic addict who lectured younger musicians about the dangers of drugs Above all he was a musician who overcame humiliation disappointment and a life threatening car wreck to take wing as Bird a brilliant improviser and composer With in depth research into previously overlooked sources and illustrated with several never before seen images Bird The Life and Music of Charlie Parker corrects much of the misinformation and myth about one of the most influential musicians of the twentieth Bluegrass Bluesman Josh Graves, 2012-09-20 A pivotal member of the hugely successful bluegrass band Flatt century and Scruggs and the Foggy Mountain Boys Dobro pioneer Josh Graves was a living link between bluegrass music and the blues In lively anecdotes Graves describes the climate in which bluegrass music emerged during the 1940s Graves accounts of daily life on the road through the 1950s and 1960s bring to life the world of an American troubadour and the mountain culture that he never left behind George Gershwin Walter Rimler, 2011-02-16 George Gershwin lived with purpose and gusto but with melancholy as well for he was unable to make a place for himself no family of his own and no real home in music He and his siblings received little love from their mother and no direction from their father Older brother and lyricist Ira managed to create a home when he married Leonore Strunsky a hard edged woman who lived for wealth and status The closest George came to domesticity was through his longtime relationship with Kay Swift She was his lover musical confidante and fellow composer But she remained married to another man while he went endlessly from woman to woman Only in the final hours of his life when they were separated by a continent did he realize how much he needed her Fatally ill unprotected by and perhaps estranged from Ira he was exiled by Leonore from the house she and the brothers shared and he

died horribly and alone at the age of thirty eight Nor was Gershwin able to find a satisfying musical harbor For years his songwriting genius could be expressed only in the ephemeral world of show business as his brilliance as a composer of large scale works went unrecognized by highbrow music critics When he resolved this guandary with his opera Porgy and Bess the critics were unable to understand or validate it Decades would pass before this his most ambitious composition was universally regarded as one of music s lasting treasures and before his stature as a great composer became secure In George Gershwin An Intimate Portrait Walter Rimler makes use of fresh sources including newly discovered letters by Kay Swift as well as correspondence between and interviews with intimates of Ira and Leonore Gershwin It is written with spirited prose and contains more than two dozen photographs Bluegrass Breakdown Robert Cantwell, 2003 Bluegrass Breakdown is an expansive foray into the makings of bluegrass More than any other book of its kind it gets to the roots of a uniquely American music that is deeply linked to working class ideals and romanticism Robert Cantwell engages the historical background commercial origins internal workings and cultural and social significance of popular old time music to provide a unique musicological and sociological perspective Well versed in the history of the tradition and equally as interested in those who listen to the music as in those who create it Cantwell links bluegrass to its hillbilly roots in Appalachia and shows how the music was transformed by African American folk traditions the influence of jazz ragtime blues and country music and the growth of radio and recording technology Record Makers and Breakers John Broven, 2009-03-02 An authoritative history of the trailblazers of the independent rock n roll record industry Champagne Charlie and Pretty Jemima Gillian M Rodger, 2010-06-17 In this rich imaginative survey of variety musical theater Gillian M Rodger masterfully chronicles the social history and class dynamics of the robust nineteenth century American theatrical phenomenon that gave way to twentieth century entertainment forms such as vaudeville and comedy on radio and television Fresh bawdy and unabashedly aimed at the working class variety honed in on its audience s fascinations emerging in the 1840s as a vehicle to accentuate class divisions and stoke curiosity about gender and sexuality Cross dressing acts were a regular feature of these entertainments and Rodger profiles key male impersonators Annie Hindle and Ella Wesner while examining how both gender and sexuality gave shape to variety By the last two decades of the nineteenth century variety theater developed into a platform for ideas about race and whiteness As some in the working class moved up into the middling classes they took their affinity for variety with them transforming and broadening middle class values Champagne Charlie and Pretty Jemima places the saloon keepers managers male impersonators minstrels acrobats singers and dancers of the variety era within economic and social contexts by examining the business models of variety shows and their primarily white working class urban audiences Rodger traces the transformation of variety from sexualized entertainment to more family friendly fare a domestication that mirrored efforts to regulate the industry as well as the adoption of aspects of middle class culture and values by the shows performers managers and consumers Aaron Copland Howard Pollack, 2000 Features the biography

Bertrand, 2000 In Race Rock and Elvis Michael T Bertrand contends that popular music specifically Elvis Presley s brand of rock n roll helped revise racial attitudes after World War II Observing that youthful fans of rhythm and

Poetry and Violence John Holmes McDowell,2000 Does art that depicts violence generate more violence Taking up a question that touches on contemporary developments such as gangsta rap and schoolyard shootings John H McDowell provides an in depth study of a body of poetry that takes violence as its subject the Mexican ballad form known as the corrido McDowell concentrates on the corrido tradition in Costa Chica where the ethnic mix includes a strong African Mexican or Afro mestizo component Through interviews with corrido composers and performers both male and female and a generous sampling of ballad texts McDowell reveals a living vernacular tradition that amounts to a chronicle of local and regional rivalries Focusing on the tragic corrido with its stories of heroic mortal encounter McDowell examines the intersection of poetry and violence from three perspectives He explores the contention that poetry celebrates violence perhaps thereby perpetuating it by glorifying for receptive audiences the deeds of past heroes He discerns a regulatory voice within the

corrido that places violent behavior within the confines of a moral universe distinguishing legitimate from illegitimate forms of violence the community in the wake of violent events A detailed case study with broad social and cultural implications. Poetry and Violence is a compelling commentary on violence as human experience and as communicative action This volume comes with a CD of corrido music taken from live performances in Costa Chica
