The Art and Imagination of Langston Hughes R Miller, 2014-10-17 Langston Hughes was one of the most important American writers of his generation and one of the most versatile producing poetry fiction drama and autobiography In this innovative study R Baxter Miller explores Hughes s life and art to enlarge our appreciation of his contribution to American letters Arguing that readers often miss the complexity of Hughes s work because of its seeming accessibility Miller begins with a discussion of the writer s auto biography an important yet hitherto neglected key to his imagination Moving on to consider the subtle resonances of his life in the varied genres over which his imagination wandered Miller finds a constant symbiotic bond between the historical and the lyrical The range of Hughes s artistic vision is revealed in his depiction of Black women his political stance his lyric and tragi comic modes This is one of the first studies to apply recent methods of literary analysis including formalist structuralist and semiotic criticism to the work of a Black American writer Miller not only affirms in Hughes s work the peculiar qualities of Black American culture but provides a unifying conception of his art and identifies the primary metaphors lying at its heart Here is a fresh and coherent reading of the work of one of the twentieth century s greatest voices a reinterpretation that renews our appreciation not only of Black American text and heritage but of the literary imagination itself

Richards, 2025-06-27 Inquiry into African American literature in recent decades has neglected to probe the intellectual structure of the tradition s aesthetics and its underlying ideology In The Ideological Origins of African American Literature Phillip M Richards begins this reconstructive work illuminating the dialectical backstory of black prose and poetry in America Richards argues that the social and political forces that influenced white literature were uniquely reacted to absorbed and often times rejected by African American literary figures from the eighteenth century Puritan notions of a God centered history to the onset of Romanticism and Modernism in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries Building his case for ideological continuity Richards surveys a profoundly creative period of 125 years launched by an African American reaction against a racist mid eighteenth century American culture This epoch in African American literature saw a fusion of Puritan Protestant culture into a religious and secular worldview drawing in the poetry of Phillis Wheatley antebellum slave narratives Richard Allen and the periodicals of the ambitious African Methodist Episcopalian movement all of which would form the underlying foundation of a Black Victorian culture A rising black middle class Richards argues would later be secularized by an eroding religious tradition under the pressures of nineteenth century modernity the trauma of Jim Crow and the emerging northern ghetto Richards further traces the emergence of Romanticism which appeared with white American authors such as Emerson Thoreau and Whitman but would not take shape in African American literature until the likes of W E B Du Bois and Langston Hughes took stock of Anglo European culture at the end of the nineteenth century The Ideological Origins of African American Literature illustrates a pattern of black writing that eschews the hegemonic white culture of the day for an evolving black culture that would define an American literary landscape Du Bois and His Rivals Raymond Wolters, 2002 W E B Du Bois was the preeminent black scholar of his era He

was also a principal founder and for twenty eight years an executive officer of the nation's most effective civil rights organization the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People NAACP Even though Du Bois was best known for his lifelong stance against racial oppression he represented much more He condemned the racism of the white world but also criticized African Americans for mistakes of their own He opposed segregation but had reservations about integration Today he would be known as a pluralist In *Du Bois and His Rivals* Raymond Wolters provides a distinctive biography of this great pioneer of the American civil rights movement Readers are able to follow the outline of Du Bois's life but the book's main emphasis is on discrete scenes in his life especially the controversies that pitted Du Bois against his principal black rivals He challenged Booker T Washington because he could not abide Washington's conciliatory approach toward powerful whites At the same time Du Bois's pluralism led him to oppose the leading separatists and integrationists of his day He berated Marcus Garvey for giving up on America and urging blacks to pursue a separate destiny He also rejected Walter White's insistence that integration was the best way to promote the advancement of black people Du Bois felt that American blacks should be full fledged Americans with all the rights of other American citizens However he believed that they should also preserve and develop enough racial distinctiveness to enable them to maintain and foster a sense of racial identity community and pride *Du Bois and His Rivals* shows that Du Bois stood for much more than protest against racial oppression He was also committed to pluralism and his pluralism emphasized the importance of traditional standards and of internal cooperation within the black community Anyone interested in the civil rights movement black history or the history of the United States during the early twentieth century will find this book valuable *African American Literature* Hans Ostrom,J.
