were critical in the creation of the South's modern identity and she reveals that tourism images created by northerners for northerners had as much effect on making the South southern as did the most ardent proponents of the Lost Cause. She also demonstrates how northern tourism contributed to the worsening of race relations in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries.

**Re-creating the American Past** Richard Guy Wilson, Shaun Eyring, Kenny Marotta, 2006. Although individually and collectively Americans have many histories, the dominant view of our national past focuses on the colonial era. The reasons for this are many and complex, touching on stories of the country's origins and of the founding fathers, the privileged position in history granted the thirteen original colonies, and the ways in which the nation has adjusted to change and modernity. But no matter the cause, the result is obvious: images and forms derived from and related to America's colonial past are the single most popular form of cultural expression. This thoughtful book argues that the rich history of western photography cannot be understood by focusing solely on the handful of well-known photographers whose work has come to define the era. Art historian Rachel Sailor points out that most photographers in the West were engaged in producing images for their local communities. These pictures didn't just entertain the settlers but gave them a way to understand their new home. **Communicating Environmental Patriotism** Anne Marie Todd, 2013-06-07 Environmental patriotism the belief that the national environment defines a country's greatness is a significant strand in twentieth century American environmentalism This book is the first to explore the history of environmental patriotism in America through the intriguing stories of environmental patriots and the rhetoric of their speeches and propaganda The See America First movement began in 1906 with the aim of protecting and promoting the landscapes of the American West In 1908 Gifford Pinchot and President Theodore Roosevelt hosted the White House Conservation Conference to promote the wise use of natural resources for generations of Americans In 1912 Pittsburgh's smoke investigation condemned the effects of coal smoke on the city's environment In World War II a massive propaganda effort mobilized millions of Americans to plant victory gardens to save resources for the war abroad While these may not seem like crucial moments for the American environmental movement this new history of American environmentalism shows that they are linked by patriotism The book offers a provoking critique of environmentalists communication strategies and suggests patriotism as a persuasive hook for new ways to make environmental issues a national priority This original research should be of interest to scholars of environmental communication environmental history American history and environmental philosophy

Narrating the Landscape Matthew N.
