Grecophile enthusiasm however led him to introduce stylistic categories in the development of classical marble sculpture that are no longer regarded as truly reflecting the evolution of Greco Roman art Thus his historicity and his classification of styles remain in doubt Winckelmann proposed that the training of modern artists should concentrate on the observation and imitation of classical models instead of looking to nature as the source of inspiration This plan succeeded to some extent in the generation that followed his untimely death Throughout the succeeding century artists and their sponsors did favour classical models and developed stylistic classicism in European freestanding sculpture in painting and in architecture
