book, and of the Negro's mind. Yet even in its character this is not a vindictive book. Bigger dies without hate for anything, except the obvious circumstances which compelled him to be what he was. Man, his lover, with the ancient wisdom of the Jews, pleads for him on the broad basis of an America in grave danger from a conflict of races which only a desperate justice can avert. Even the Negro evangelist who tries to bring Bigger to the emotional religion which has helped so many such and worse of his race, is greeted with sympathy and justice.

Indeed, two statements may be made with safety by the most conservative critic about this remarkable novel. No reader, however hardened by its brutal brutalities, will be able to keep it in its depressing story, which ends and means with a tale of crude violence breaking into a human tragedy. And no white man—and, I suspect, few Negroes—will finish this narrative without an enlargement of imagination toward the psychological problems of the Negroes in our society—and an appreciable extension of sympathy. This will hold, I prophesy, for South as well as North. Indeed, I suspect that this book and its problems will be less of a surprise to, and more readily understood by, Southerners than by Northerners. Mr. Wright himself was born and educated in Mississippi, and has lived his later life in the North. It is not the residents of the South, or the almost like-a-white-man Negro of the North, but the essential Negro in America of both, that he gets into Bigger and his book.

Let me repeat, this novel is no tract or defense plea. Like *Gone with the Wind*, it is a fully realized story of enthusiasm, uncomprehendingly realistic, and quite as human as it is Negro. In the growing list of artistic achievements of a high quality, by a race which is, perhaps, singularly gifted in art, *Native Son* must surely be added, with a star for notable writers. —From the Book of the Month Club News

Richard Wright was born on a plantation in Mississippi, the son of a cotton-picker and country school teacher. With his family eventually on the move, his education and upbringing were erratic. At eleven he left home, becoming his way all over the country, working at any kind of job from dish-cleaning to clocking in a post office, and always making everything else fall into his hands. Eventually he became head of the Harlem branch of a New York newspaper. His first book, *Uncle Tom's Children*, won him prior to a national contest held by Henry Luce, the Guggenheim Foundation read *Native Son* and awarded him a Fellowship.
