Black Fire is a naked indictment of American prejudice and a flaming prophecy of future turmoil. It may well be one of the most important books ever published in the United States. In the essays, poems, short stories and plays of this collection, over seventy black writers—among them Stokely Carmichael, Harold Cruse, A. R. Spellman, Sun-Ra, Ed Bullins, and the editors themselves, LeRoi Jones and Larry Neal—search for a definition of the black condition, the sensibility of a colonized people waking up to the realities of the contemporary world. Most of the contributors are under the age of thirty-five. They are members of the Black Power generation, the Black Consciousness generation. Their work is addressed primarily to black people and the Third World of Africa, Asia and Latin America, but it will be—it must be—of interest to anyone who wants to understand the mood of the black man in America.
