

American Ethnic Groups Jack F. Kinton, 1973 The Black Struggle for Public Schooling in Nineteenth-Century Illinois Robert L. McCaul, 2009-03-10 In the pre Civil War and Civil War periods the Illinois black code deprived blacks of suffrage and court rights and the Illinois Free Schools Act kept most black children out of public schooling But as McCaul documents they did not sit idly by They applied the concepts of bargaining power rewarding punishing and dialectical and the American ideal of community to participate in winning two major victories during this era By the use of dialectical power exerted mainly via John Jones tract The Black Laws of Illinois they helped secure the repeal of the state s black code by means of punishing power mainly through boycotts and invasions they exerted pressures that brought a cancellation of the Chicago public school policy of racial segregation McCaul makes clear that the blacks struggle for school rights is but one of a number of such struggles waged by disadvantaged groups women senior citizens ethnics and immigrants He postulates a stage pattern for the history of the black struggle a pattern of efforts by federal and state courts to change laws and constitutions followed by efforts to entice force or persuade local authorities to comply with the laws and constitutional articles and with the decrees of the courts Black San Francisco Albert S. Broussard, 1993-04-26 By 1867 black San Franciscans had gained access to public transportation In 1869 they were granted the right to vote by the state of California In 1875 they fought for desegregated schools and won Yet in 1957 Willie Mays was initially denied the opportunity to purchase a home in an exclusive San Francisco neighborhood because he was black In Black San Francisco Albert Broussard explores race relations in a city where whites for the most part were outwardly civil to blacks while denying them employment opportunities and political power Understanding the texture of the racial caste system he argues is critical to understanding why blacks made so little progress in employment housing and politics despite the absence of segregation laws When it came to racial equality in the early twentieth century Broussard argues the liberal progressive image of San Francisco was largely a facade Illustrating how black San Franciscans struggled to achieve equality in the same manner as their counterparts in the Midwest and East he challenges the rhetoric of progress and opportunity with evidence of the reality of inequality for black San Franciscans Black San Francisco is considerably broader in scope than any previous study of African Americans in the West It provides extensive coverage of the city's black community during the Great Depression and the New Deal details civil rights activities from 1915 to 1954 and provides extensive biographical material on local black leaders In his reconstruction of the plight of San Francisco s black citizens Broussard reveals a population that despite its small size before 1940 did not accept second class citizenship passively yet remained nonviolent into the 1960s He also shows how World War II was a watershed for Black San Francisco bringing thousands of southern migrants to the bay area to work in the war industries These migrants in tandem with native black residents formed coalitions with white liberals to attack racial inequality more vigorously and successfully than at any previous time in San Francisco's history Makina a

Wolcott, 2013-01-01 In the early decades of the twentieth century tens of thousands of African Americans arrived at Detroit's Michigan Central Station part of the Great Migration of blacks who left the South seeking improved economic and political conditions in the urban North The most visible of these migrants have been the male industrial workers who labored on the city's automobile assembly lines African American women have largely been absent from traditional narratives of the Great Migration because they were excluded from industrial work By placing these women at the center of her study Victoria Wolcott reveals their vital role in shaping life in interwar Detroit Wolcott takes us into the speakeasies settlement houses blues clubs storefront churches employment

Radano, 2009-05-20 New Musical Figurations exemplifies a dramatically new way of configuring jazz music and history By relating biography to the cultural and musical contours of contemporary American life Ronald M Radano observes jazz practice as part of the complex interweaving of postmodern culture a culture that has eroded conventional categories defining jazz and the jazz musician Radano accomplishes all this by analyzing the creative life of Anthony Braxton one of the most emblematic figures of this cultural crisis Born in 1945 Braxton is not only a virtuoso jazz saxophonist but an innovative theoretician and composer of experimental art music His refusal to conform to the conventions of official musical culture has helped unhinge the very ideologies on which definitions of jazz black music popular music and art music are founded New Musical Figurations gives the richest view available of this many sided artist Radano examines Braxton's early years on the South Side of Chicago whose vibrant black musical legacy inspired him to explore new avenues of expression Here is the first detailed history of Braxton's central role in the Association for the Advancement of Creative Musicians the principal musician run institution of free jazz in the United States After leaving Chicago Braxton was active in Paris and New York collaborating with Philip Glass Steve Reich Frederic Rzewski and other composers affiliated with the experimental music movement From 1974 to 1981 he gained renown as a popular jazz performer and recording artist Since then he has taught at Mills College and Wesleyan University given lectures on his theoretical musical system and written works for chamber groups as well as large opera scale pieces The neglect of radical challenging figures like Braxton in standard histories of jazz Radano argues mutes the innovative voice of the African American musical tradition Refreshingly free of technical jargon New Musical Figurations is more than just another variation on the same jazz theme Rather it is an exploratory work as rich in theoretical vision as it is The Rise of Gospel Blues Michael W. Harris, 1994-06-23 Most observers believe that gospel music has in historical detail been sung in African American churches since their organization in the late 1800s Yet nothing could be further from the truth as Michael W Harris s history of gospel blues reveals Tracing the rise of gospel blues as seen through the career of its founding figure Thomas Andrew Dorsey Harris tells the story of the most prominent person in the advent of gospel blues Also known as Georgia Tom Dorsey had considerable success in the 1920s as a pianist composer and arranger for prominent blues singes including Ma Rainey In the 1930s he became involved in Chicago's African American old line Protestant churches where his background in the blues greatly influenced his composing and singing Following much controversy during the
