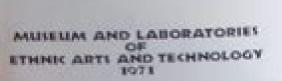
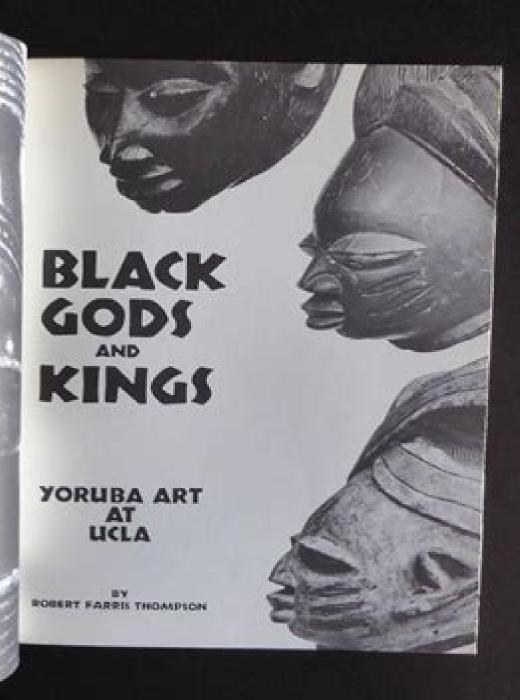

Peel, 2015-11-27 A free ebook version of this title is available through Luminos University of California Press s open access publishing program for monographs Visit www luminosoa org to learn more The Yoruba of southwestern Nigeria are exceptional for the copresence among them of three religious traditions Islam Christianity and the indigenous orisa religion In this comparative study at once historical and anthropological Peel explores the intertwined character of the three religions and the dense imbrication of religion in all aspects of Yoruba history up to the present For over 400 years the Yoruba have straddled two geocultural spheres one reaching north over the Sahara to the world of Islam the other linking them to the Euro American world via the Atlantic These two external spheres were the source of contrasting cultural influences notably those emanating from the world religions However the Yoruba not only imported Islam and Christianity but also exported their own orisa religion to the New World Before the voluntary modern diaspora that has brought many Yoruba to Europe and the Americas tens of thousands were sold as slaves in the New World bringing with them the worship of the orisa Peel offers deep insight into important contemporary themes such as religious conversion new religious movements relations between world religions the conditions of religious violence the transnational flows of contemporary religion and the interplay between tradition and the demands of an ever changing present In the process he makes a major theoretical contribution to the anthropology of world Afro-Cuban Diasporas in the Atlantic World Solimar Otero, 2010 Afro Cuban Diasporas in the Atlantic World religions explores how Yoruba and Afro Cuban communities moved across the Atlantic between the Americas and Africa in successive waves in the nineteenth century In Havana Yoruba slaves from Lagos banded together to buy their freedom and sail home to Nigeria Once in Lagos this Cuban repatriate community became known as the Aguda This community built their own neighborhood that celebrated their Afrolatino heritage For these Yoruba and Afro Cuban diasporic populations nostalgic constructions of family and community play the role of narrating and locating a longed for home By providing a link between the workings of nostalgia and the construction of home this volume re theorizes cultural imaginaries as a source for diasporic

community reinvention Through ethnographic fieldwork and research in folkloristics Otero reveals that the Aguda identify strongly with their Afro Cuban roots in contemporary times Their fluid identity moves from Yoruba to Cuban and back again in a manner that illustrates the truly cyclical nature of transnational Atlantic community affiliation Solimar Otero is Associate Professor of English and a folklorist at Louisiana State University Her research centers on gender sexuality Afro Caribbean spirituality and Yoruba traditional religion in folklore literature and ethnography Dr Otero is the recipient of a Ruth Landes Memorial Research Fund grant 2013 a fellowship at the Harvard Divinity School's Women's Studies in Religion Program 2009 to 2010 and a Fulbright award 2001 Essays for a Humanist ,1975 Congotay! history because so little has been written about them After Glassie selected the area roughly Goochland and Louisa counties for study he selected a representative part of the countryside recorded all the older houses there developed a transformational grammar of traditional house designs and examined the area's architectural stability and change Comparing the houses with written accounts of the period he found that the houses became more formal and less related to their environment at the same time as the areas established political economic and religious institutions were disintegrating It is as though the builders of the houses were deliberately trying to impose order on the surrounding chaotic world Previous orthodox historical interpretations of the period have failed to note this Glassie has provided new insights into the intellectual and social currents of the period and has rescued a heretofore little known people from historiographical oblivion Combining a fresh perceptive approach with a broad interdisciplinary body of knowledge Glassie has made an invaluable breakthrough in showing the way to understand the people of history who have left their material things as their only legacy Blackness in Chile Juan Eduardo Wolf, 2019-04-30 Chile had long forgotten about the existence of the country's Black population when in 2003 the music and dance called the tumbe carnaval appeared on the streets of the city of Arica Featuring turbaned dancers accompanied by a lively rhythm played on hide head drums the tumbe resonated with cosmopolitan images of what the African Diaspora looks like and so helped bring attention to a community seeking legal recognition from the Chilean government which denied its existence Tumbe carnaval however was not the only type of music and dance that Afro Chileans have participated in and identified with over the years In Styling Blackness in Chile Juan Eduardo Wolf explores the multiple ways that Black individuals in Arica have performed music and dance to frame their Blackness in relationship to other groups of performers a process he calls styling Combining ethnography and semiotic analysis Wolf illustrates how styling Blackness as Criollo Moreno and Ind gena through genres like the baile de tierra morenos de paso and caporales simultaneously offered individuals alternative ways of identifying and contributed to the invisibility of Afro descendants in Chilean society While the styling of the tumbe as Afro descendant helped make Chile s Black community visible once again Wolf also notes that its success raises issues of representation as more people begin to perform the genre in ways that resonate less with local cultural memory and Afro Chilean activists goals At a moment when Chile's government continues to discuss whether to recognize the Afro Chilean population and Chilean society struggles to come to terms with an increase in Latin American Afro descendant immigrants Wolf's book raises awareness of Blackness in Chile and the variety of Black music dance throughout the African Diaspora while also providing tools that ethnomusicologists and other scholars of expressive culture can use to study the role of music dance in other cultural Masquerading Politics John Thabiti Willis, 2018-01-15 Willis should be commended for penetrating a complex contexts and socially guarded ritual resource to glean the hidden histories manifested therein African Studies Review In West Africa especially among Yoruba people masquerades have the power to kill enemies appoint kings and grant fertility John Thabiti
