To Destroy Painting Louis Marin, 1995-03 The work of the eminent French cultural critic Louis Marin 1931 92 is becoming increasingly important to English speaking scholars concerned with issues of representation To Destroy Painting first published in France in 1977 marks a milestone in Marin's thought about the aims of painting in Europe in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries A meditation on the work of Poussin and Caravaggio and on their milieux the book explores a number of notions implied by theories of painting and offers insight into the aims and effects of visual representation The Arcadian Landscape University of Kansas. Museum of Art, 1972 Arcadian Waters and Wanton Seas Arne Neset, 2009 The nineteenth century was the great age of landscape painting in Europe and America In an era of rapid industrialization and transformation of landscape pictures of natural scenes were what people wanted most to display in their homes The most popular and marketable pictures often degenerating into kitsch showed a wilderness with a pond or a lake in which obtrusive signs of industry and civilization had been edited out Inspired by Romantic ideas of the uniqueness of the nation pictorial and literary art was supposed to portray the soul of the nation and the spirit of place a view commonly adopted by cultural and art historians on both sides of the Atlantic Arcadian Waters and Wanton Seas argues that nationalistic or exceptionalist interpretations disregard deep rooted iconological traditions in transatlantic culture Depictions and ideas of nature go back to the classical ideas of Arcadia and Eden in which fountains ponds lakes rivers and finally the sea itself are central elements Following their European colleagues American artists typically portrayed the American Arcadia through the classical conventions Arcadian Waters and Wanton Seas adopts the interdisciplinary and comparative methodological perspectives that characterize American studies The book draws on art history cultural history literature and the study of the production and use of visual images and will serve well as a textbook for courses on American studies or cultural history of the Western world H. adopted and adapted by the Augustan infused culture of eighteenth century England where it gained popularity with writers artists architects and their wealthy patrons who from the later eighteenth century commissioned retreats gate lodges estate workers housing and seaside villas designed to appear as cottages The enthusiasm for cottages within polite society did not last By the mid nineteenth century cottage related building and book publishing had slowed and the idea of the cottage itself was eventually lost beneath the Tudor barge boards and decorative chimneystacks of the Historic Revival And yet while both designer and consumer have changed over time the idea of the cottage as the ideal rural retreat continues to resonate through English architecture and English culture
