**1915 Lyn Macdonald, 1993**      **1915 Lyn MacDonald, 1993-10-28**      **1915 Lyn MacDonald, 1994-10-27**      **Boy Soldiers of the Great War** Richard van Emden, 2021-11-24 After the outbreak of the Great War boys as young as twelve were caught up in a national wave of patriotism and in huge numbers volunteered to serve their country The press recruiting offices and the Government all contributed to the enlistment of hundreds of thousands of under age soldiers in both Britain and the Empire On joining up these lads falsified their ages often aided by parents who believed their sons obvious youth would make overseas service unlikely These boys frequently enlisted together training for a year or more in the same battalions before they were sent abroad Others joined up but were soon sent to units already fighting overseas and short of men these lads might undergo as little as eight weeks training Boys served in the bloodiest battles of the war fighting at Ypres the Somme and on Gallipoli Many broke down under the strain and were returned home once parents supplied birth certificates proving their youth Other lads fought on bravely and were even awarded medals for gallantry Jack Pouchot won the Distinguished Conduct Medal aged just fifteen Others became highly efficient officers such as Acting Captain Philip Lister and Second Lieutenant Reginald Battersby both of whom were commissioned at fifteen and fought in France In this the final update of his ground breaking book Richard van Emden reveals new hitherto unknown stories and adds many more unseen images He also proves that far more boys enlisted in the British Army under age than originally estimated providing compelling evidence that as many as 400 000 served      **Aubers Ridge** Edward Hancock, 2005-09-19 This book describes the action of 9 May 1915 when the battalions of the 1st Division 7th Division and the Indian Army attacked Aubers Ridge Their objective was to break the German line and cut the supply route to the enemy troops fighting to the south against a French Offensive at Vimy Ridge In true Battleground style the dramatic story is told through the actions of those involved in the fighting Places and points of interest are highlighted and for those fortunate enough to visit the area there are excellent directions and hints on how to best capture the atmosphere      **Conchies** Andy Ward, 2015-07-28 On the centenary of the Great War we hear and read of valiant and heroic stories There is another story one less spoken of The story of the people who refused to fight for their country Today the individuals mentioned in this book would be the focus of internet trolls In their own day they elicited an equally vehement reaction from their communities These were the people who refused to fight for their country and they were known as Conscientious Objectors This book provides a remarkable testimony about the experiences of conscientious objectors and their treatment at the hands of the state It contradicts the received view that these objectors were treated universally brutally by the army the prison system and the government and is bound to lead to a modification of the orthodox view Andy Ward was given access to 300 letters that had been discovered in a local family s attic They record a correspondence from 1916 to the end of the war between Leonard and Roland Payne two brothers who chose to become conscientious objectors and their friends and family The letters follow their journey as the authorities attempted to dissuade

them from their course of action through punishment until finally they were placed in a situation where they could be useful

Conchies is not a work of purely local history Rather it is a case study local history in a national context and national history in a local context It is also a very human story treated with balance and thought It will appeal to those interested in the First World War civilian experiences of the War British social history the evolving nature of public opinion and the ethical and moral issues of conscience

**The Lusitania Saga & Myth** David Ramsay,2015-08-28 An account of one of the greatest maritime disasters in history the Lusitania s proud service its sinking by a German U Boat and the tragic aftermath When the RMS Lusitania entered service in 1907 she was the pride of the Cunard fleet The first transatlantic express liner powered by marine turbines she had a top speed of twenty five knots and could make the Liverpool New York crossing in five days restoring British supremacy along the key North Atlantic route All this ended during World War I on 7 May 1915 when she was torpedoed by a German submarine and sank eighteen minutes later taking with her the lives of the 1 198 passengers and crew In this well researched book the author concentrates not just on the disaster but its consequences including the political recriminations and the governmental inquiry The loss of American citizens was a major reason why the United States entered the War Fully illustrated with rare historical photographs this is a fascinating study of a major shipping catastrophe with profound repercussions that would have an effect not just on maritime law but on the future of the world
