offer an entirely new analysis of Renais work She also delineates how Japanese films came to produce the martyrdom narrative of the hibakusha in the early postwar period Producing Hiroshima and Nagasaki allows us to trace the complex and entangled political threads that link representations of Hiroshima and Nagasaki reminding us that narratives and images deploy different effects in different places and times This highly original approach establishes a new kind of transnational and transpacific studies on Hiroshima and Nagasaki and raises the possibility of a comparative area studies to match the age of world literature

*Organizing the Spontaneous* Wesley Sasaki-Uemura,2001-05-01 In 1960 millions of Japanese citizens took to the streets for months of protest against the U S Japan Security Treaty Anpo and its forcible ratification by the Kishi government In the decades that followed the Anpo era citizens movements exerted a major influence on the organization and political philosophies of the anti Vietnam War effort local residents environmental movements alternative lifestyle groups and consumer movements *Organizing the Spontaneous* departs from previous scholarship by focusing on the significance of the Anpo protests on the citizens drive to transform Japanese society rather than on international diplomacy It shows that the movement against Anpo comprised diverse at times conflicting groups of politically conscious actors attempting to reshape the body politic

Witness Literature Horace Engdahl,2002 In December 2001 the centennial of the first Nobel Prize was celebrated in Stockholm To mark the occasion

the Swedish Academy organized a symposium on the theme of OC Witness Literature. OCO Talks were given by speakers from Asia, Africa and Europe including three Nobel laureates in literature: Nadine Gordimer, Kenzaburo Oe and Gao Xingjian. The main objective of the symposium was to examine the concept of witness literature and its relevance to contemporary literature. This concept is relatively new and has not yet been defined clearly by literary criticism and scholarship. The discussion primarily alternated between two aspects of the topic: the particular claim to truth that witness literature puts forward and the process that leads from catastrophe to creativity and that turns the victim into a writing witness with the power to suspend forgetfulness and denial. This volume, edited by Horace Engdahl, Permanent Secretary of the Swedish Academy, brings together all the talks given at the symposium.

**Hiroshima** Andrew J. Rotter, 2008-02-28. The US decision to drop an atomic bomb on the Japanese city of Hiroshima on 6 August 1945 remains one of the most controversial events of the twentieth century. However, the controversy over the rights and wrongs of dropping the bomb has tended to obscure a number of fundamental and sobering truths about the development of this fearsome weapon. The principle of killing thousands of enemy civilians from the air was already well established by 1945 and had been practised on numerous occasions by both sides during the Second World War. Moreover, the bomb dropped on Hiroshima was conceived and built by an international community of scientists, not just by the Americans. Other nations, including Japan and Germany, were also developing atomic bombs in the first half of the 1940s, albeit haphazardly. Indeed, it is difficult to imagine any combatant nation foregoing the use of the bomb during the war had it been able to obtain one. The international team of scientists organized by the Americans just got there first. As this fascinating new history shows, the bomb dropped by a US pilot that hot August morning in 1945 was in many ways the world's offspring in both a technological and a moral sense. And it was the world that would have to face its consequences strategically, diplomatically and culturally in the years ahead.

*Japanese Women Novelists in the 20th Century* Sachiko Shibata Schierbeck, 1994. It was not until Kawabata Yasunari won the 1968 Nobel Prize for literature that the average Western reader became aware of contemporary Japanese literature. A few translations of writings by Japanese women have appeared lately, yet the West remains largely ignorant of this wide field. In this book, Sachiko Schierbeck profiles the 104 female winners of prestigious literary prizes in Japan since the beginning of the century. It contains summaries of their selected works and a bibliography of works translated into Western languages from 1900 to 1993.
