Nielson, Ph.D., 2018-02-01 As a unique distant geographical region of the United States Alaska has evolved from military insignificance to high strategic priority in the 142 years since its purchase from Russia in 1867 The reasons for this dramatic shift derive from a correlation of geography foreign policy domestic politics and military technology Historically the role of the armed forces in Alaska has been large and diverse Alaska was one of the two principal territorial purchases made by the United States between 1803 and 1867 adding nearly 15 million square miles to America's national domain Smaller by the size of Texas than Jefferson's Louisiana Purchase Alaska unlike all of the territories and states carved out of the former languished in obscurity and isolation and was administered as a colonial dependency by the military and other branches of the federal government its official territorial status and government notwithstanding While sharing many common aspects of frontier settlement and Western history with territories such as Montana the Dakotas Wyoming and Colorado Alaska presented special challenges peculiar to a non contiguous arctic and sub Arctic environment separated from the United States by a foreign power Indeed only the defeated South under Reconstruction experienced the same degree of military occupation and martial law Alaska also has the unique distinction in the American experience of belonging to Imperial Russia before it became of interest to American expansionists Still others found Alaska tempting and pursued their own designs North of 53 The Spanish British Canadians and even the French plied Alaska's waters and made their claims to Alyeska the Great Land And it is with these clashing imperial ambitions that this three volume history begins

Mapping the Americas Shari M. Huhndorf, 2011-02-23 In *Mapping the Americas* Shari M Huhndorf tracks changing conceptions of Native culture as it increasingly transcends national boundaries and takes up vital concerns such as patriarchy labor and environmental exploitation the emergence of pan Native urban communities global

imperialism and the commodification of indigenous cultures While nationalism remains a dominant anticolonial strategy in indigenous contexts Huhndorf examines the ways in which transnational indigenous politics have reshaped Native culture especially novels films photography and performance in the United States and Canada since the 1980s Mapping the Americas thus broadens the political paradigms that have dominated recent critical work in Native studies as well as the geographies that provide its focus particularly through its engagement with the Arctic Among the manifestations of these new tendencies in Native culture that Huhndorf presents are Igloodik Isuma Productions the Inuit company that has produced nearly forty films including Atanarjuat The Fast Runner indigenous feminist playwrights Leslie Marmon Silko s Almanac of the Dead and the multimedia artist Shelley Niro Huhndorf also addresses the neglect of Native America by champions of postnationalist American studies which shifts attention away from ongoing colonial relationships between the United States and indigenous communities within its borders to U S imperial relations overseas This is a dangerous oversight Huhndorf argues because this neglect risks repeating the disavowal of imperialism that the new American studies takes to task Parallel transnational tendencies in American studies and Native American studies have thus worked at cross purposes as pan tribal alliances draw attention to U S internal colonialism and its connections to global imperialism American studies deflects attention from these ongoing processes of conquest Mapping the Americas addresses this neglect by considering what happens to American studies when you put Native studies at the center

Arnold,2009-11-17 In The Fishermen s Frontier David Arnold examines the economic social cultural and political context in which salmon have been harvested in southeast Alaska over the past 250 years He starts with the aboriginal fishery in which Native fishers lived in close connection with salmon ecosystems and developed rituals and lifeways that reflected their intimacy The transformation of the salmon fishery in southeastern Alaska from an aboriginal resource to an industrial commodity has been fraught with historical ironies Tribal peoples usually considered egalitarian and communal in nature managed their fisheries with a strict notion of property rights while Euro Americans so vested in the notion of property and ownership established a common property fishery when they arrived in the late nineteenth century In the twentieth century federal conservation officials tried to rationalize the fishery by improving upon nature and promoting economic efficiency but their uncritical embrace of scientific planning and their disregard for local knowledge degraded salmon habitat and encouraged a backlash from small boat fishermen who clung to their irrational ways Meanwhile Indian and white commercial fishermen engaged in identical labors but established vastly different work cultures and identities based on competing notions of work and nature Arnold concludes with a sobering analysis of the threats to present day fishing cultures by forces beyond their control However the salmon fishery in southeastern Alaska is still very much alive entangling salmon fishermen industrialists scientists and consumers in a living web of biological and human activity that has continued for thousands of years **Empire's Edge** Preston Jones,2007 In 1898 Nome Alaska burst into the American consciousness when one of the largest gold strikes in the world occurred on its shores Over the next ten years Nome s population exploded as both men and women came north to seek their fortunes Closer to Siberia than to New York Nome s citizens created their own version of small town America on the northern frontier Less than 150 miles from the Arctic Circle they weathered the Great War and the diphtheria epidemic of 1925 as well as floods fires and the Great Depression They enlivened the Alaska winters with pastimes such as high school basketball and social clubs Empire s Edge is the story of how ordinary Americans made a life on the edge of a continent a life both ordinary and extraordinary **A Study Guide for**

Purvis, 2021-09 Ragged Coast Rugged Coves explores the untold story of cannery workers in Southeast Alaska from 1878 when the first cannery was erected on the Alexander Archipelago through the Cold War The cannery jobs brought waves of immigrants starting with Chinese followed by Japanese and then Filipino nationals Working alongside these men were Alaska Native women trained from childhood in processing salmon Because of their expertise these women remained the mainstay of employment in these fish factories for decades while their husbands or brothers fished often for the same company Canned salmon was territorial Alaska s most important industry The tax revenue though meager kept the local government running and as corporate wealth grew it did not take long for a mix of socioeconomic factors and politics to affect every aspect of the lands waters and population During this time the workers formed a bond and shared their experiences troubles and joys Alaska Natives and Chinese Japanese and Filipino immigrants brought elements from their ethnic heritage into the mix creating a cannery culture Although the labor was difficult and frequently unsafe the cannery workers and fishermen were not victims When they saw injustice they acted on the threat In the process the Tlingits and Haidas clans of Southeast Alaska for more than ten thousand years aligned their interests with Filipino activists and the union movement Ragged Coast Rugged Coves tells the powerful story of diverse peoples uniting to triumph over adversity *Handbook of Visual Communication* Kenneth L.
