



Alzheimer's Disease: Frequently Asked Questions

Alzheimer's disease is the most common form of dementia, and this terminal, progressive brain disorder has no known cause or cure. It slowly steals the minds of its victims, leading to memory loss, confusion, impaired judgment, personality changes, disorientation, and the inability to communicate. More than 5.4 million Americans are believed to have Alzheimer's disease, and by 2050, as the U.S. population ages, this number could increase to 13 million. There are nearly 35 million people living with dementia worldwide, and this number is likely to increase to more than 125 million by 2050.

What is the difference between Alzheimer's disease and dementia?

Dementia is a decline in thinking, reasoning, and/or remembering. People with dementia have difficulty carrying out daily tasks they have performed routinely and independently throughout their lives. The two most common forms of dementia—Alzheimer's disease and vascular dementia—are irreversible, although sometimes their symptoms can be managed. Alzheimer's disease

accounts for 60 to 80 percent of cases of dementia. The lesser known vascular dementia is a hardening of the arteries in the brain that causes blockage in blood flow.

If a person appears to be losing mental abilities to a degree that interferes with daily activities and social interactions, consult a doctor to determine if he or she is suffering from Alzheimer's disease or another form of dementia.

What are the stages of Alzheimer's disease?

Pre-symptomatic

Physical conditions connected to Alzheimer's disease exist in a person's body long before symptoms are evident. State-of-the-art equipment is being developed to detect subtle signs of Alzheimer's prior to noticeable memory loss.

From the patient's perspective, Alzheimer's disease can be described in three general stages of progression:

Mild (stage 1): In addition to minor memory loss and difficulty learning, first-stage Alzheimer's disease may cause a loss of energy and spontaneity,
