

works, his academic talks, rebellious letters seem to be the raw perceptions and interesting spirit. Elsewhere, the spirit of demonstration seems more oblique, with Lawrence displaying the very sublimity he is angrily denying. But another way, the primary insights and some of his work reveal themselves as images and gestures that point on the annihilating, suspended, rebellious, demonic, and communicative. A number of previous commentators on Lawrence have properly noted these peculiarities, although not, I think, in sufficient depth to give the pervasiveness its full significance. In reading the numerous criticisms on Lawrence, one comes to feel that it proclaims a moral line, with those who condemn Lawrence and his pervasiveness on one side, and on the other side those who praise him and deny his pervasiveness. In contrast, I shall treat the pervasiveness as neither too positive, as an authentic mode with excellent aesthetic possibilities and considerable human wisdom.

Let us start with a characteristically perverse declaration of Lawrence's, one by no means a kindly statement, which reveals his attitude toward the act of persecution. In affirming his belief in art as creativity, he writes: "You have to have something vicious in you to be a creative writer. It is the something vicious, subliminal, incompatible to the 'ordinary' world, inside a man, which gives an edge to his awareness. . . ." "Vicious?" Might not this be a characterful hyperbole just to emphasize the grandness of that writer's calling? Apparently not, one way and another Lawrence repeatedly makes the linkage of awareness and viciousness, and without any romantic qualifications that the artist is separate from all other men. A similar point of perverse talking and alienation appears in his descriptions of the enemy that he demands. For example: "Nothing is wonderful unless it is dangerous. Dangerous to that other part of the soul, and therefore damnable." "The other, as we shall see, seems as a key word and quality in Lawrence's insistence on passionate desire and alienation. It would seem to point something quite close to what the traditionally religious means by *secret*, on its subjective side. The

**D. H. Lawrence and Ambivalence in the Age of Modernity** Gaku Iwai, 2024-05-01 D H Lawrence is renowned for his scathing criticism of the ruling class industrialisation of the country and wartime patriotism. However, his texts bear the imprint of contemporary dominant ideologies and discourses of the period. Comparing Lawrence's texts to various major and minor contemporary novels, journal articles, political pamphlets, and history books, this book aims to demonstrate that Lawrence's texts are ambivalent; his texts harbour the dynamism of conflicting power struggles between the subversive and the reactionary. For example, in some apparently apolitical texts such as *The White Peacock* and *Movements in European History*, reactionary ideologies and wartime propaganda are embedded. Some texts like *Lady Chatterley's Lover* are intended to be a radical critique of the period wherein it was composed, but they also bear discernible traces of the contemporary frame of reference that they intend to subvert. Focusing on Lawrence's stories and novels set in the mining countryside and the works composed under the impact of the First World War, this book establishes that Lawrence's texts in fact consist of multiple layers that are often in conflict with each other, serving as a testimony to the age of modernity.

**The Risen Adam** Virginia Hyde, 2010-11 Showing Lawrence's familiarity with biblical typology from both written and visual sources, Virginia Hyde explores its many ironic and paradoxical versions in his works. She demonstrates his use of typological precursors of Christ such as Adam and David, Moses and Aaron, and his development of a coherent cosmology centered on the cross and the Tree of Life. These features often take on radically revisionist meanings when informed by Lawrence's interests in theosophy and occult lore. Hyde fully recognized Lawrence's intensely dynamic style and examines the ways in which he works creatively with his models. Hyde sheds new light on Lawrence's leadership views, linking them to patriarchal assumptions inherent in biblical typology. She utilizes manuscripts and sketches as well as his traditional works to show that a complex form of biblical symbolism affects both his form and content in unexpected ways. His symbols are often traceable to iconographic models with typological significance. *The Risen Adam* includes pioneering treatments of the first Quetzalcoatl, the 1923 version of *The Plumed Serpent* so different in part from the final novel as to form a separate creative effort. Hyde also offers provocative new readings of *The Rainbow*, *Women in Love*, *Aaron's Rod*, *The Border Line*, *The Plumed Serpent*, *David*, *The Man Who Died*, *Birds*, *Beasts*, and *Flowers*, and other works. The book is illustrated with artwork by Lawrence and with examples of the medieval and other iconography he knew.

**Rhythmic Modernism** Helen Rydstrand, 2019-01-24 Contrary to the common view that cultural modernism is a broadly anti-mimetic movement, one which turned away from traditional artistic goals of representing the world, Rhythmic Modernism argues that rhythm and mimesis are central to modernist aesthetics. Lawrence's Final Fictions** Ben Stoltzfus, 2024-04-08 D H Lawrence's Final Fictions A Lacanian Perspective explores how literature thinks more specifically how the reading of fiction influences behavior Lawrence writes passionately about our alienation from ourselves from other people and from the cosmos He believes that we need to heed the voices of our unconscious and he shows us how to meld body and mind so that psychoanalytically speaking Id and Ego can come together In this endeavor there is a salient convergence between Lawrence's writings and those of Jacques Lacan the French psychoanalyst In this book Stoltzfus examines the poetics of seven major fictions that Lawrence wrote between 1925 and 1930 five productive years that are referred to as his fabulation period In each of the book's seven chapters in tandem with Lacan's writings Stoltzfus analyzes seven major characters four of whom move from alienation to the renewal of self and the cosmos He argues that Lawrence's fiction is simultaneously descriptive and prescriptive by showing us how to circumvent dysfunction Stoltzfus brings literature and psychoanalysis together in readings that are both aesthetic and epistemological They are recipes for curing the Anthropocene

D.H.
