*Prehistoric, Ancient Near Eastern & Aegean Textiles and Dress* Mary Harlow, Cécile Michel, Marie-Louise Nosch, 2014-09-30 Textile and dress production from raw materials to finished items has had a significant impact on society from its earliest history The essays in this volume offer a fresh insight into the emerging interdisciplinary research field of textile and dress studies by discussing archaeological iconographical and textual evidence within a broad geographical and chronological spectrum The thirteen chapters explore issues such as the analysis of textile tools especially spindle whorls and textile imprints for reconstructing textile production in contexts as different as Neolithic Transylvania the Early Bronze Age North Aegean and the Early Iron Age Eastern Mediterranean the importance of cuneiform clay tablets as a documentary source for both drawing a detailed picture of the administration of a textile industry and for addressing gender issues such as the construction of masculinity in the Sumerian kingdoms of the 3rd millennium BC and discussions of royal and priestly costumes and clothing ornaments in the Mesopotamian kingdom of Mari and in Mycenaean culture Textile terms testify to intensive exchanges between Semitic and Indo European languages especially within the terminology of trade goods The production and consumption of textiles and garments are demonstrated in 2nd millennium Hittite Anatolia from 1st millennium BC Assyria a cross disciplinary approach combines texts realia and iconography to produce a systematic study of golden dress decorations and finally the important discussion of fibres flax and wool in written and archaeological sources is evidence for delineating the economy of linen and the strong symbolic value of fibre types in 1st millennium Babylonia and the Southern Levant The volume is part of a pair together with Greek and Roman Textiles and Dress An Interdisciplinary Anthology edited by Mary Harlow and Marie Louise Nosch

**Science and Civilisation in China, Part 9, Textile Technology: Spinning and Reeling** Joseph Needham, Dieter Kuhn, 1988-06-09 This study, the first of two parts, gives a comprehensive account of Chinese textiles and textile technology and deals with the evolution of bast fibre spinning and silk reeling in the history of China. These operations are the basic techniques in the production of yarn and thread, pre-requisite to weaving, and any study of Chinese textile technology must start with the raw material obtained from fibre plants such as hemp, ramie, jute, cotton, etc. and silk reeled off from cocoons of the domestic silkworm. The time span covered runs from the Neolithic to the nineteenth century. Archaeological and pictorial evidence, the bulk of it hitherto unpublished in the West, is brought together with Chinese textual sources which are extensively translated and interpreted to illustrate Chinese achievements in this field. Professor Kuhn's study reveals the way in which Chinese textile technological inventiveness has influenced textile production in other regions of the world and in medieval Europe. It explains how textile technology reached its high point between the tenth and thirteenth centuries and attempts to indicate the reasons for its subsequent relative decline. The development of the textile industry in Europe was a key factor in the rise of capitalism. In the case of China, after Sung times, textile technology and the organisation of textile labour may help indicate why such a development did not take place in China.

*French Art Deco* Jared Goss, 2014-09-30 Art Deco: the term conjures up jewels by Van Cleef such as Cubism and Fauvism and a taste for the exotic, all of which converged in exceptionally luxurious and innovative objects. While the practice of Art Deco ended with the Second World War, interest in it has not only endured to the present day but has grown steadily. examined in conjunction with our present knowledge of archaeological textiles. In particular, the study explores the question of whether the selected images complement the archaeological clothing sources through a new analytical tool which enables us to compare and contrast the object categories in regard to material, function, chronology, context, and interpretation. The tool is used to record and analyze the numerous details of the iconographic costumes and to facilitate a clear and easy description. This deliberate use of explicit costume shapes enhances our interpretation and understanding of the Late Iron Age clothing tradition. Thus, the majority of the costumes depicted are identified in the Scandinavian archaeological textile record, demonstrating that the depictions are a reliable source of research for both iconographical costume and archaeological clothing. The book contributes with new information on social, regional, and chronological differences in clothing traditions from ca AD 400 to the Viking Age.
