Blood and Black Lace Roberto Curti, 2020-01-31 Mario Bava's *Blood and Black Lace* 1964 is commonly considered the archetypal giallo. This book examines its main narrative and stylistic aspects including the groundbreaking prominence of violence and sadism and its use of color and lighting as well as Bava's irreverent approach to genre and handling of the audience's expectations.

**Sound and Horror in the Giallo Film** Damien Pollard, 2025 The Italian giallo was a sleazy violent and stylistically baroque form of horror film that was produced in the hundreds from the 1960s to the 1980s. *Sound and Horror in the Giallo Film* listens closely to these films asking how their soundtracks and their use of the human voice can help us understand the giallo's significance at a time when Italy was undergoing profound postwar social economic political and cultural change. Throughout the history of Italian cinema soundtracks have been a site of concerted and sustained intervention by political and economic forces. In *Sound and Horror in the Giallo Film* author Damien Pollard argues that because the giallo film pushed the boundaries of film form while also touting unapologetic commercialism the voices on its soundtracks were both aesthetically exaggerated and directly shaped by commercial imperatives which were influenced by Italy's turbulent postwar years. Featuring case studies of several well-known giallo films including *The Girl Who Knew Too Much*, *The Bird with the Crystal Plumage* and *Tenebrae*, *Sound and Horror in the Giallo Film* is an original analysis that reveals how the cinematic voice binds film and history.

Evans-Powell, 2021-02-28 Widely regarded as one of the foundational Unholy Trinity of folk horror film, *The Blood on Satan's Claw* (1971) has been comparatively overshadowed if not maligned when compared to *Witchfinder General* (1968) and *The Wicker Man* (1973). While those horror bedfellows are now accepted as classics of British cinema, Piers Haggard's film remains undervalued, ironically so given that it was Haggard who coined the term folk horror in relation to his film. In this Devil's Advocate, David Evans-Powell explores the place of the film in the wider context of the folk horror sub-genre, its use of a seventeenth-century setting which it shares with contemporaries such as *Witchfinder General* and *Cry of the Banshee*, in contrast to the generic nineteenth-century locales of Hammer, the influences of contemporary counter-culture and youth movement on the film, the importance of localism and landscape, and the film as an expression of a wider contemporary crisis in English identity which can also be perceived in *Witchfinder General* and in contemporary TV series such as *Penda's Fen*.

*Euro Horror* Ian Olney, 2013-02-07 Beginning in the 1950s, Euro Horror movies materialized in astonishing numbers from Italy, Spain, and France and popped up in the US at rural drive-ins and urban grindhouse theaters such as those that once dotted New York's Times Square. Gory, sexier, and stranger than most American horror films of the time, they were embraced by hardcore fans and denounced by critics as the worst kind of cinematic trash. In this volume, Olney explores some of the most popular genres of Euro Horror cinema, including giallo films (named for the yellow covers of Italian pulp fiction), the S-M horror film, and cannibal and zombie films, and develops a theory that explains their renewed appeal to audiences today.

The chapters introduce readers to a wide range of films, including masterpieces from Argento and overlooked gems, all of them examined in close detail.
