Arnhem Land in Colour Robert Edwards, Bruce Guerin, 1970 *The Art of Grahame King* Sasha Grishin, Libby Bright, Caroline Field, 2005 Grahame Kings life as an artist began with his mastery of the new art of colour reproduction as a photolithographic colour etcher in Melbourne in the 1930s At the same time study at the National Gallery Art School with George Bell assisted his development as a painter After war service and travels abroad King returned to Melbourne with his wife the sculptor Inge King The two held a number of joint exhibitions of paintings and sculptures in Australia throughout the 1950s and then from c 1962 Grahame King turned his attention increasingly towards the art of lithography becoming a master in this field of printmaking He has also devoted himself to promoting the art of lithography and printmaking generally through the Print Council of Australia He is often called Australias patron saint of printmaking The book examines his seven decades working as an artist in Melbourne and is lavishly illustrated with colour reproductions throughout Primes and Universals Anna Wierzbicka, 1996-03-28 This book provides a synthesis of Wierzbicka's theory of meaning which is based on conceptual primitives and semantic universals using empirical findings from a wide range of languages While addressed primarily to linguists the book deals with highly topical and controversial issues of central importance to several disciplines including anthropology psychology and philosophy Conceptual primitives and semantic universals are the cornerstones of a semantic theory which Anna Wierzbicka has been developing for many years Semantics Primes and Universals is a major synthesis of her work presenting a full and systematic exposition of that theory in a non technical and readable way It delineates a full set of universal concepts as they have emerged from large scale investigations across a wide range of languages undertaken by the author and her colleagues On the basis of empirical cross linguistic studies it vindicates the old notion of the psychic unity of mankind while at the same time offering a framework for the rigorous description of different languages and cultures A major synthesis of Anna Wierzbicka s work Names and Substance in the Australian Subsection System Carl Georg Brandenstein, 1982-11 Structural analysis of subsection system as opposition between six basic physical or temperamental qualities constructs from this classification an Aboriginal World Order material drawn from many areas with an emphasis on north west Australia includes tribal index to contents Colour in Art John Gage, Kelly Grovier, 2023-09-07 The complex phenomenon of colour has received detailed attention from the perspectives of physics chemistry physiology psychology linguistics and philosophy However the people who work most closely with colour artists have rarely been canvassed for their opinions on this mysterious subject John Gage sets out to address this omission by focusing on the thoughts and practices of artists Colour in Art is concerned with the history of colour but is not itself a history instead each chapter develops a theme from a different scientific discipline as seen from the viewpoint of such diverse artists such as Wassily Kandinsky Vincent van Gogh Sonia Delaunay Bridget Riley and Clifford Possum Tjapaltjarri Drawing on examples through the ages from ancient times to the present the many topics covered include flags synaesthesia

management It is a memoir of growing up in one of the most isolated parts of Australia in a small aboriginal missionary community in the Northern Territory something the equivalent of the remote Canada or Alaska It is the landscape featured in the movie Crocodile Dundee It tells of the huge change in this place in the last half century with the coming of land rights and aboriginal self determination It also tells of my mother and fathers lives and Christian beliefs which motivated their contribution to this change It is a story of my memories and love for this remote and beautiful place in which I lived as a child then worked as an adult and of many NT characters who gave me the memories It is also the story of me working as an adult across many parts of the NT and about the hardy outlandish characters that inhabit this place It also tells of my own experience of surviving attack by a large crocodile in a remote swamp It also provides a foundation for my novels in the Crocodile Spirit Dreaming Series The places in these books are the places in which I lived and worked and many of the stories came little changed from people I knew In particular my experience in surviving a crocodile attack of a large saltwater crocodile which mauled my leg as told in this book forms part of the central role of the crocodile as a predator in this novel series The role of my father in opening road transport including building a crossing of the East Alligator River developing outstations for aboriginal communities learning to fly on missionary wages and establishing an aviation service along with assisting the aboriginal peoples of this land to gain royalties from mining is a story that deserves to be told as a major part of NT history Along with his tireless work the contribution of many others is also an essential part of the story

The Makers and Making of Indigenous Australian Museum Collections Nicolas Peterson, Lindy Allen, Louise Hamby, 2008 This volume of original essays brings together for the first time histories of the making and of the makers of most of the major Indigenous Australian museum collections These collections are a principal source of information on how Aboriginal people lived in the past Knowing the context in which any collection was created the intellectual frameworks within which the collectors were working their collecting practices what they failed to collect and what Aboriginal people withheld is vital to understanding how any collection relates to the Aboriginal society from which it was derived Once made collections have had mixed fates some have become the jewel of a museum s holdings while others have been divided and dispersed across the world or retained but neglected The essays in this volume raise issues about representation institutional policies the periodisation of collecting intellectual history material culture studies Aboriginal culture and the idea of a collection The Archaeology of Rock-Art Christopher Chippindale, Paul S. C. Taçon, 1998 Pictures painted and carved in caves and on open rock surfaces are amongst our loveliest relics from prehistory This pioneering set of sparkling essays goes beyond guesses as to what the pictures mean instead exploring how we can reliably learn from rock art as a material record of distant times in short rock art as archaeology Sometimes contact period records offer some direct insight about indigenous meaning so we can learn in that informed way More often we have no direct record and instead have to use formal methods to learn from the evidence of the pictures themselves The book s eighteen papers range wide in space and time from the Palaeolithic of Europe
