**Imagination in Design** Mads Nygaard Folkmann, 2013-04-12 A theoretically informed investigation that relates the philosophies of aesthetics and imagination to understanding design practice In *The Aesthetics of Imagination in Design* Mads Folkmann investigates design in both material and immaterial terms Design objects Folkmann argues will always be dual phenomena material and immaterial sensual and conceptual actual and possible Drawing on formal theories of aesthetics and the phenomenology of imagination he seeks to answer fundamental questions about what design is and how it works that are often ignored in academic research Folkmann considers three conditions in design the possible the aesthetic and the imagination Imagination is a central formative power behind the creation and the life of design objects aesthetics describes the sensual conceptual and contextual codes through which design objects communicate the concept of the possible the enabling of new uses conceptions and perceptions lies behind imagination and aesthetics The possible Folkmann argues is contained as a structure of meaning within the objects of design which act as part of our interface with the world Taking a largely phenomenological perspective that reflects both continental and American pragmatist approaches Folkmann also makes use of discourses that range from practice focused accounts of design methodology to cultural studies Throughout he offers concrete examples to illustrate theoretical points Folkmann's philosophically informed account shows design in all its manifestations from physical products to principles of organization to be an essential medium for the articulation and transformation of culture *On Picture Making and Picture Seeing* Jan B. **Gadamer's Ethics of Play** Monica Vilhauer, 2010-09-25 *Gadamer's Ethics of Play: Hermeneutics and the Other* examines the ethical dimensions of understanding by focusing on Gadamer's concept of play as it is developed in his magnum opus *Truth and Method* Monica Vilhauer argues for the global relevance of play in Gadamer's philosophical hermeneutics by revealing play as the key concept that depicts the process of all understanding that is the dynamic dialogical and interpretive process by which interlocutors come to grasp a common subject matter together Through the lens of dialogue play the book focuses on openness toward one's dialogue partner respect for his differing point of view and a willingness to learn from him in conversation as crucial ethical conditions of genuine understanding The book aims to revive the ethical heart of philosophical hermeneutics and reveal the transforming power of the Other in Gadamer's hermeneutics While *Gadamer's Ethics of Play* develops his philosophical hermeneutics as an ethical philosophy in the style of the older tradition of Aristotelian practical philosophy it is finally critical of the extent to which Gadamer's hermeneutics can be used as a guide to practice The book points out our need for guidance when we face our most prevalent obstacle to understanding a closedness to the Other or unwillingness to engage in conversation but finds no guidance from Gadamer in scenarios where ethical conditions are lacking Inspired by Gadamer's discussion of play the book searches for types of human interaction that might have the power to open or re-open the play of dialogue between those who have become closed to each other so that true understanding between them can be developed The book is accessible to an undergraduate audience while also being relevant to ongoing debates among Gadamer scholars

**A Return to Aesthetics** Jonathan Loesberg, 2005 *A Return to Aesthetics* confronts postmodernism's rejection of aesthetics by showing that this critique rests on central concepts of classical aesthetic theory namely autonomous form disinterest and symbolic discourse The author argues for the value of these concepts by recovering them through a historical reinterpretation of their meaning prior to their distortion by twentieth century formalism Loesberg then applies these concepts to a discussion of two of the most significant critics of the ideology of Enlightenment Foucault and Bourdieu He argues that understanding the role of aesthetics in the postmodern critique of Enlightenment will get us out of the intellectual impasse wherein numbingly repeated attacks upon postmodernism as self-contradictory match numbingly repeated defenses Construing postmodern critiques as examples of aesthetic reseeing gives us a new understanding of the postmodern critique of the Enlightenment

**Seeing Differently** Amelia Jones, 2013-06-19 *Seeing Differently* offers a history and theory of ideas about identity in relation to visual arts discourses and practices in Euro American culture from early modern beliefs that art is an expression of an individual the painted image a world picture expressing a comprehensive and coherent point of view to the rise of identity politics after WWII in the art world and beyond The book is both a history of these ideas for example tracing the dominance of a binary model of self and other from Hegel through classic 1970s identity

politics and a political response to the common claim in art and popular political discourse that we are beyond or post identity In challenging this latter claim *Seeing Differently* critically examines how and why we identify works of art with an expressive subjectivity noting the impossibility of claiming we are post identity given the persistence of beliefs in art discourse and broader visual culture about who the subject is and offers a new theory of how to think this kind of identification in a more thoughtful and self reflexive way Ultimately *Seeing Differently* offers a mode of thinking identification as a queer feminist durational process that can never be fully resolved but must be accounted for in thinking about art and visual culture Queer feminist durationality is a mode of relational interpretation that affects both art and interpreter potentially making us more aware of how we evaluate and give value to art and other kinds of visual culture
