Hopkins, 2013-09-13 This interdisciplinary study theorizes the interaction of individual performance and social space Examining three categories of space the urban the theatrical and the cartographic this volume considers the role of performance in the production and operation of these spaces during a period in London s history defined roughly by the life of Shakespeare City Stage Globe not only organizes a selection of plays pageants maps and masques in the historical and cultural contexts in which they emerged but also uses performance theory to locate the ways in which these seemingly ephemeral events contributed to lasting change in the spatial concepts and physical topography of early modern London *The Cosmographia of Sebastian Münster* Matthew McLean, 2016-03-23 Sebastian Münster s *Cosmographia* was an immensely influential book that attempted to describe the entire world across all of human history and analyse its constituent elements of geography history ethnography zoology and botany First published in 1544 it went through thirty five editions and was published in five languages making it one of the most important books of the Reformation period Beginning with a biographical study of Sebastian Münster his life and the range of his scholarly work this book then moves on to discuss the genre of cosmography The bulk of the book however deals with the *Cosmographia* itself offering a close reading of the 1550 Latin edition the last and definitive edition worked upon by Münster By analysing the contents of the *Cosmographia* it attempts to recreate how the world of the sixteenth century appeared to a scholar living in Basel and understand what he saw and heard Through this examination of Münster his publications and scholarly networks the conflicts and continuities between medieval scholarly traditions and the widening horizons of the sixteenth century are explored and revealed Of interest to scholars of humanist culture the Reformation and book history this ambitious work throws into relief previously overlooked aspects of the intellectual and religious culture of the time **Looking for Longitude** Katy Barrett, 2022-11-17 Why make a joke out of a niche and complex scientific problem That is the question at the heart of this book which unearths the rich and surprising history of trying to find longitude at sea in the eighteenth century Not simply a history on water this is the story of longitude on paper of the discussions satires diagrams engravings novels plays poems and social anxieties that shaped how people understood longitude in William Hogarth s London We start from a figure in one of Hogarth s prints a lunatic incarcerated in the madhouse of *A Rake s Progress* in 1735 to unpick the visual mental and social concerns which entwined around the national concern to find a solution to longitude Why does longitude appear in novels smutty stories political critiques copyright cases religious tracts and dictionaries as much as in government papers This sheds new light on the first government scientific funding body the Board of Longitude established to administer vast reward money for anyone who found a means of accurately measuring longitude at sea Meet the cast of characters involved in the search for longitude from famous novelists

and artists to almost unknown pamphleteers and inventors and see how their interactions informed the fate of longitude's most famous pursuer the clockmaker John Harrison

Misra, 2014-01-01 The first edition of Fundamentals of Cartography was published in 1969 by Prasara University of Mysore It was reprinted by the Concept Publishing Company New Delhi in While the book remained in currency the cartographic processes changed drastically when information technology brought a sea of change in the sources of information drafting of maps and printing processes Drawing maps by hand became obsolete surveying whether ground or aerial was no longer the only major source of information In view of these changes it became necessary to bring out a new edition Realising that unless one knows directions scales projections coordinates ground and air surveys one would fail to understand the proper use of modern information technology in the drawing the maps Thus the contents of 1969 edition are retained and new chapters have been added to update the book In Part II of the book a chapter on Remote Sensing and Satellite Imagery has been added and Part V contains chapters on Computer Aided Cartography Geographic Information System GIS Land Information System LIS and Global Positioning System GPS
