

discuss different groups access to the political process prostwar economic issues including women s work and the interrelated problems of industrialization education and race relations The Civil Rights Acts of the 1960s transformed political and social landscapes but vestiges of the old attitudes and prejudices remain in place Trouble in Goshen Fred C. Smith, 2014 The Great Depression emboldened Americans to tolerate radical experimentation in search of solutions to seemingly overwhelming economic problems Amongst the thorniest of those was rural southern poverty In Trouble in Goshen Fred C Smith focuses on three communities designed and implemented to meet that challenge This book examines the economic and social theories and their histories that resulted in the creation and operation of the most aggressive and radical experiments in the United States Trouble in Goshen chronicles three communitarian experiments both the administrative details and the struggles and reactions of the clients Smith covers the Tupelo Homesteads in Mississippi the Dyess Colony in Arkansas and the Delta Cooperative Farm also in Mississippi The Tupelo Homesteads were created under the aegis of the tiny Division of Subsistence Homesteads a short lived first New Deal agency Dyess Colony was the largest of the Resettlement Administration's efforts to transform failed farmers into Jeffersonian yeoman farmers. The third community the Delta Cooperative Farm a product of the active cooperation between the Socialist Party of America and a cadre of liberal churchmen led by Reinhold Niebuhr attempted to meld the pieties passions propaganda and theories of Jesus and Marx The equipment facilities and management styles of the projects reveal a clearly delineated class order among the poor Trouble in Goshen demonstrates the class conscious angst that enveloped three distinct levels of poverty and the struggles of plain folk to preserve their tenuous status and avoid overt peasantry **Terror in the Heart of Freedom** Hannah Rosen, 2009-06-01 The meaning of race in the antebellum southern United States was anchored in the racial exclusivity of slavery coded as black and full citizenship coded as white as well as male These traditional definitions of race were radically disrupted after emancipation when citizenship was granted to all persons born in the United States and suffrage was extended to all men Hannah Rosen persuasively argues that in this critical moment of Reconstruction contests over the future meaning of race were often fought on the terrain of gender Sexual violence specifically white on black rape emerged as a critical arena in postemancipation struggles over African American citizenship Analyzing the testimony of rape survivors Rosen finds that white men often staged elaborate attacks meant to enact prior racial hierarchy Through their testimony black women defiantly rejected such hierarchy and claimed their new and equal rights Rosen explains how heated debates over interracial marriage were also attempts by whites to undermine African American men s demands for suffrage and a voice in public affairs By connecting histories of rape and discourses of social equality with struggles over citizenship Rosen shows how gendered violence and gendered rhetorics of race together produced a climate of terror for black men and women seeking to exercise their new rights as citizens Linking political events at the city state and regional levels Rosen places gender and sexual violence at the heart of understanding the reconsolidation of race and racism in the postemancipation United States

Beyond the Rope Karlos K. Cobb, 2000 Commonwealth College was the longest lived and most notorious of the resident labor colleges that operated during the 1920s and 1930s Founded in 1923 at NewLlano Cooperative Colony in Vernon Parish Louisiana the school was modeled on the self maintenance characteristics of Florida's abortive prewar experiment in social education Ruskin College Disputes over priorities with NewLlano Colony forced the College to relocate to rural Polk County Arkansas in 1924 where it took up permanent residence in the dense piney woods at the foot of Rich Mountain Commonwealth's early leaders were dedicated Debsian Socialists who were convinced that a different type of education for the new industrial class would result in a series of massive social changes that would transform American capitalism into the utopian cooperative commonwealth of their dreams The regional and national publicity that resulted from the allegations that the College was a Moscow driven red cell became a self fulfilling prophecy from the mid to late 1930s Commonwealth endured spectacular attacks by the American Legion in 1926 from a Communist student strike in 1933 from investigations by the Arkansas General Assembly in 1935 and 1937 and through its association with the Southern Tenant Farmer's Union By 1938 the school had exhausted the patience of the people it had been founded to educate the industrial workers Finally without any friends in the non Communist left Commonwealth attempted to become the southern campus of the New Theatre League but strident local opposition brought a court action that forced the College to close in September 1940 William H Cobb illuminates the history of the extraordinary group of students and staff of Commonwealth College and the rich intellectual life produced on the self sustaining communal farm in the Arkansas forest Although Cobb did not have access to Commonwealth College papers which disappeared after being impounded by the county court he reconstructs the history of the school through a rich assortment of primary documents from various university and state archives Scholars and students

Agee, 2011-12-01 Daniel A Rudd born a slave in Bardstown Kentucky grew up to achieve much in the years following the Civil War His Catholic faith passion for activism and talent for writing led him to increasingly influential positions in many places One of his important early accomplishments was the publication of the American Catholic Tribune which Rudd referred to as the only Catholic journal owned and published by colored men At its zenith the Tribune run out of Detroit and Cincinnati where Rudd lived had ten thousand subscribers making it one of the most successful black newspapers in the country Rudd was also active in the leadership of the Afro American Press Association and he was a founding member of the Catholic Press Association By 1889 Rudd was one of the nation s best known black Catholics His work was endorsed by a number of high ranking church officials in Europe as well as in the United States and he was one of the founders of the Lay Catholic Congress movement Later his travels took him to Bolivar County Mississippi and eventually on to Forrest City Arkansas where he worked for the well known black farmer and businessperson Scott Bond and eventually co wrote Bond s biography
