Dixon, 2006 This book examines the Accademia degli Arcadi in its heyday a little known phenomenon in Italian history in the first part of the eighteenth century The Roman academy aimed for a peninsula wide cultural renewal induced by literary reform Operating within a papal court society it eschewed extant patronage systems and social hierarchies and introduced enlightened ideas to its members By about 1730 the Arcadi was on the wane the reform largely unmet It was an easy target for critics both its proponents and opponents in part because of the visible role it assigned to women By attending to the institution's policies this book provides a rich understanding of the Arcadi's goals It locates the organization's interest in theater including the physical environment of the theatrical drama as central to its operations It is argued that like a stage set the Bosco Parrasio the garden that the Arcadi built for its literary presentations is a visual manifestation of Arcadian goals
