Palmer,1980 Abstract Anorexia nervosa is an eating disorder typified by the loss of appetite and the extreme thinness of its victims usually teenage girls The disease is associated with a psychological affliction which results in a physical condition Hormonal changes are noted in chronic starvation and symptoms such as amenorrhea are common Neuroendocrine changes which occur during disease progression interact with psychobiological state perpetuating the disease Women susceptible to the onset of the disease have been classified into a particular personality type and often come from similar family backgrounds
